# Crop, Feed Loans Available Now

W. C. Armstrong to Accept Applications at Court House

For the convenience of Centre county farmers, applications for Emergency Crop and Feed Loans will be accepted by Walter C. Armstrong at the Court House in Bellefonte, it was announced by Field Supervisor Joseph C. Myers of Harrisburg.

"Our agency which is a part of the Farm Credit Administration, is making every effort to cooperate with Secretary of Agriculture Wickard's 'Food For Freedom Program.' Our aim," Mr. Myers pointed out, is to assist those farmers who are eligible to obtain crop loans so that they may take advantage of cash prices for seed, fertilizer and other costs necessary for the production of 1942 crops.

He stated that the primary factors in determining eligibility are the character of the applicant, plan of operations, and his ability to grow and take care of his crops.

"The only security required is a note and crop lien on the particular crops to be financed. Loans may be obtained up to \$400 at 4 per cent interest and it is the policy of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office to lend no more than the borrower can conveniently repay from his farming operations," Mr. Myers said.

"We also insist upon a live-at-home program and the farmers are requested to grow good gardens and maintain sufficient livestock to supply their own family needs."

In addition to crop loans, Mr. Myers reported that the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office also makes loans for the purpose of producing and purchasing feed for livestock in which instance a chattel mortgage on the livestock to be fed is the security required.

Mr. Myers pointed out that he makes regular visits to Centre county, but in order to maintain better service he has arranged with Mr. Armstrong to take applications at any time.

# State College Man War's First 'Veteran'

State College this week laid claim to the first "veteran" of World War II in the person of Sgt. Lloyd G. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Smith, of South Frazier street, State College.

Sgt. Smith was inducted Saturday night into State College Post Veterans of Foreign Wars and is believed to be the first American soldier to be so honored since the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7.

Smith recently returned from Hawaii, and has been assigned to the Officers' Training School at Aberdeen, Md., where he is now undergoing a 90-day training course. He was under actual fire during the December 7 attack on the Hawaiian Islands.

The new V. F. W. member was a senior at Penn State in 1940 and in January 1941 he enlisted in the U. S. Army, arriving in Hawaii on March 28, 1941. He rose steadily through the ranks to his present rating and at the end of his training period at Aberdeen he is scheduled to become a second lieutenant. He is an expert with firearms.
