Man Killed As Express Hits Truck

fractures of both legs between the knee and ankle, a dislocation of the right hip, and crush injuries of the chest. According to reports, the only known eye-witness of the accident was the locomotive fireman, S. Miller, of Altoona, but no statement has been obtained from him locally at this time. He is quoted as having told the engineer, E. H. Woodring, of Tyrone, that the truck was traveling east on the Bald Eagle Valley Express, in the same direction as the train, at a point where the railroad runs alongside the highway for some distance, when the truck turned right to enter the private drive into the R. N. Naylor farmhouse. Apparently the truck driver was completely unaware of the train, for he is said to have turned across the tracks just as the speeding locomotive reached the crossing. There was a tremendous crash and as the battered truck was carried along by the locomotive, dragging parts are said to have hurled a shower of heavy ballast stones over onto the highway. Junk in the truck was strewn along the railroad right-of-way and scores of ties showed marks and creases where parts of the truck had gouged heavily into the wood before the train was brought to a halt, near the Dix Run service station. Members of the train crew found the unconscious truck driver in the wreckage and when signs of life were detected he was immediately placed in the baggage car, while wreckage was piled away so that the train could continue. The locomotive, blowing great clouds of steam from the broken cylinder cock, con-

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continued to the Bellefonte station where the driver was placed in the Widdowson ambulance and rushed to the hospital. He was pronounced dead on arrival there. The body was taken to the Widdowson funeral home and later to Lock Haven to be prepared for burial. The passenger train, due in Bellefonte at 1:30 p. m., was reported to be 14 minutes behind schedule when it passed through Julian, several miles west of the accident scene. The Express operates daily between Altoona and Lock Haven, and in the latter city is turned and returns to Altoona via the westbound Lehigh Express. The damaged locomotive was uncoupled in Bellefonte and a freight locomotive was substituted for the remainder of the run. Later in the day the locomotive was taken to Altoona for repairs. D. A. Yarnell, Pennsylvania Railroad agent in Bellefonte, said that the railroad is conducting an investigation into the accident. Since the crash did not occur on a highway, it is believed that the State Motor Police will not make an official investigation. Mr. Cohen resided at 637 East Main street, Lock Haven, and is survived by his wife and two children. Funeral services were held yesterday morning in Lock Haven, with interment in the Jewish cemetery, that city. Deputy Coroner Frank Baird last night reported that a formal inquest into the fatality will be held either tonight or tomorrow night. He had not decided definitely where the inquest would be held.
