This is the last notice which will be given and all property tax not paid by that time will be disposed of according to law by the Commissioners. Don't let this added expense be part of your obligation but make arrangements with the tax collector for cleaning up all your tax before this penalty is added. It is the duty of all property tax payers to return to the County Commissioners all unpaid property tax May 1st, and none will be held over this year.

The life of a surgeon, even in these modern days, still entails long and harrowing battles with the elements, according to a story that is told about the experience of Dr. Enoch H. Adams, Bellefonte, chief of staff of the Centre County Hospital, in the blizzard which struck this area suddenly late Monday night and continued through most of Tuesday. Dr. Adams was sleeping soundly through the blizzard at 3:40 a. m. Tuesday when the phone rang. The man on the other end was a Lock Haven physician, who related that a patient seriously ill with appendicitis required an immediate operation. Lock Haven surgeons were out-of-town, he explained, Dr. Adams began dressing when the electric power failed and the lights of his home went out. He completed dressing in total darkness, groped his way to the garage and finally set out for the 30-mile trip to Lock Haven, going by way of Nittany Valley. Snow piled up on the windshield, and all out-of-the-headlights, so that all that could be seen most of the time was a dim swirl of snow in a world of white. Finally the car met a snow plow, which was proceeding slowly at its heavy work. Several times Dr. Adams passed the plow to try to continue at a faster gait, but each time he was forced to return to a position at the rear of the plow. And so it was that the clocks of Lock Haven showed exactly 7:30 a. m. when he finally arrived at his destination, approximately 3 1/2 hours to cover 30 miles. But after that time things moved more satisfactorily. The operation was performed and the patient is doing nicely.

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## Farm Loan Unit In Annual Meeting

(Continued from page one) there is at present over \$300,000 loaned to farmers in Centre county. Mr. Akers also gave a talk on "Twenty-five Years of Service Rendered to Centre County Farmers by The Federal Land Bank of Baltimore."

Among the visitors present was Miles H. Cubbons, of the Soil Conservation Administration, who gave a talk on soil erosion and its remedies. He explained the different types of farm land in Centre county and the way soil conservation can do away with unnecessary waste in each type.

Ralph C. Blaney, County Agent, gave an interesting report on the work of his office and the ways it serves the Centre county farmer. George M. Mothersbaugh of Bellefonte, representative of Production Credit, gave a brief summary of the purpose of Production Credit, and the ways it is attempting to meet the farmers' requirements for financing in view of the changing world conditions. Oakley Havens, supervisor of the Farm Security Administration, whose office is in Tyone, outlined the purpose of his administration and the many ways it fits in with a large number of farmers' needs.

Organized in Bellefonte, the Centre County National Farm Loan Association is celebrating this year the 25th anniversary of this cooperative farm mortgage institution through which farmers obtain long-term low interest rate loans from the Federal Land Bank of Baltimore. Last November an office was opened in Bellefonte in order to be of greater service to Centre county farmers. The office is located at 13 East High street and adjoins the W. C. Smeltzer home. Mr. Akers is in the office every Tuesday and the remaining days it is in charge of Jean Faunting of Bellefonte.
