SCOTIA

(From Last Week)

The Pennsylvania Game Commission has made arrangements with the Boal Estate whereby they will purchase 4000 acres in the Barrens, south of the Scotia ore mines. This is a greater portion of a tract of land formerly known as the Pennsylvania Furnace tract which consists of 4300 acres in all. This land from what we learn is to be used for a game refuge. This land as stated before, was the Pennsylvania Furnace tract which later was known as the Lyons tract, and about the year 1900 or near that date the Royal Springs Paper Mill Company bought it from the Lyons estate, and in 1908 or 1909 the Mc-Nitt-Huyet Lumber Co. bought it from the Paper Mill Co. and lumbered it, which took about five or six years. The lumber company then sold it to T. D. Boal. Many different people have been there and looked things over for different purposes. But to date nothing has happened other than what was just mentioned.

There are two very fine water wells and probably the third one, which could be used for water purposes. These wells are all drilled to a depth of four hundred and sixty-five feet, with a very large volume of water, and during the operation of the mines these wells were in operation 24 hours a day, six days a week. Two of them pumped a 6-inch stream and the third pumped a 4-inch stream. There wouldn't be any danger of a shortage of water for these wells were just as strong as the day the mines ceased operations as they were the day they were first operated.

There are rumors afloat yet about the mines starting up again, but the foundation of it all don't seem to be any better than last week. About the percentage of the ore at Scotia, it would average around 30 per cent iron, some locations a little more and some less.

PENN STATE DEAN REPORTS ON RUBBER

All the rubber we need can be produced eventually in the Western Hemisphere if we can solve the labor problem in rubber-growing regions, according to Dean Edward Steidle, of the School of Mineral Industries, Pennsylvania State College. Dean Steidle recently returned from a 22,000-mile air trip to the Latin Americas.

"Although it may take about 10 years to develop new rubber plantations to the production stage, our supply of rubber could be increased several hundred per cent from the many wild trees already growing in the Amazon valley, if local labor would co-operate," Dean Steidle said.

He pointed out that Brazil will either have to furnish the labor or permit the United States to import it from such sources as Puerto Rico.
