WOODYCREST REVIVAL SERVICES CONTINUE

The special services are being conducted by Evangelist Michael J. Anzalone, of Jamestown, N. Y. Last Sunday night the church was crowded to capacity, and an overflow congregation is expected for the closing service Sunday night.

Dr. Fred Hooser, principal of the Public Institute of Harrisburg, declared that three great lessons have been learned by the United States and England as the result of the war.

First, sufficient attention has not been given to sound plans of physical education; second, the nations as a whole have swung too far away from the true concepts of religion; third, leaders of labor organizations must learn that new rights for labor automatically carry with them new responsibilities.

Dr. Hooser deplored the increasing trend toward centralization of government, and claimed that the loss of governmental rights by local communities is threatening the foundations of the Democratic form of government. He condemned the theory of isolationism for America, now or in the future, and called upon for a renewal of faith in the rights granted by the constitution.

(Continued from page one) considerable distance by the car which continued south on the boulevard for three city blocks and demolished a street sign at the intersection of Plank Road, coming to a stop on the street car tracks.

The boy was picked up by a passing motorist, and died on the way to Mercy hospital, Altoona. Death was attributed to a fractured skull.

Bigley was uninjured when his car hit a street sign. The machine was damaged to the extent of about \$60, the right front and left rear tires were blown out and the right front fender and headlamp were damaged.

Bigley is being held by city police on orders given by Blair County Coroner Chester C. Rothrock.
