Fugitive Gets 8 to 16 Years

(Continued from page one) down and crawl out, he went with them, he told the court.

After working for 1 1/2 years as a truck driver in California, the man related, a man with whom he spent an evening was robbed of \$21, and he (Harding) was picked up by police. Fingerprints revealed his identity and because he had a record, he claimed, the robbery was pinned on him. He was sentenced to Poisons Prison, California.

In that institution he served 7 years and 3 months and during that time he saw the prison converted from what was termed a "mad-house" to a decent place, largely because of the rehabilitation program instituted there. He learned two trades in the prison, receiving credit as a welder and machinist. Harding concluded.

Sheriff Edward Miller on Saturday took Harding to the Western State Penitentiary to begin his term.

Orville Rogers, 31, of Pittsburgh, and his brother Thomas, 29, of Philadelphia, pleaded guilty to stealing limestone chips from the State Department of Highways and each was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and a fine of \$25.

Pvt. John L. Eisenhoth, of the State Police at Rockview sub-station, prosecutor in the case, said the men took three-fourths of a ton of chips, valued at \$3, from a highway stock pile along Route 350 near Philadelphia. They had the stone in the back of a 1941 sedan when they were apprehended in Philadelphia last Wednesday by Eisenhoth and Pvt. E. B. Barrie, also of the Rockview sub-station, the officer reported. All the material was returned to the Highway Department.

The brothers, who said they were going to use the stone to construct a walk, told the court they didn't realize they weren't allowed to take the stone.

In passing sentence, Judge Walker commented that there seems to be a rather widespread and entirely wrong opinion that highway stone piled along the roads can be taken by anyone who needs such material.
