Rabies Outbreak In Country Towns

be penned up securely. If infected they will show evidences of the disease in ten days, and action can be taken accordingly.

Two persons were bitten by an infected dog at Coleville, Sunday, and at least eight dogs in that area are said to have been bitten by the same animal.

Saturday afternoon a small dog owned by William E. King, of Valley View, went to the Archie Irvin property at Coleville, and was seen at various times that day about the barn, acting in a peculiar manner.

About 7 o'clock Sunday morning members of the Irvin family heard dogs fighting outside and opened the door. The Irvin's two dogs ran in, followed by the King dog. The latter animal bit Walter Cethcart, 58, who resides at the Irvin home, and when the Irvin's son, Donald, aged 16, attempted to get the rabid dog out of the house, it bit him quite severely on the shoulder.

That afternoon the King dog ran through Coleville, and reportedly bit six other dogs before Donald Irvin's brother, William, shot the animal. The head was sent to Harrisburg where it was examined in the State laboratories. Tuesday morning the Irvin's received a telegram from Harrisburg to the effect that the King dog was infected with rabies.

The wounds inflicted on other dogs in Coleville are reported to be infected. In addition to the Irvin dogs, animals owned by Miles Lee and Bert Poorman, at Coleville, are reported to have infected wounds.

Late yesterday Officer Peters said the State Veterinarian from Hollidaysburg as well as Health Officer W. W. Bicketts, of Bellefonte, joined in the investigation in the Coleville area.

Officer Peters said he had rounded up four dogs which had been bitten by the King animal. He stressed the fact that all suspected animals should be confined securely inside so that children or other persons can't reach them.

Warnings against rabies have been issued in State College since last weekend when the State reported that a West College avenue cocker spaniel had died of that disease.

Police in that borough issued a warning that all dogs positively must be kept at home, or on a leash when outside.

The State College dog escaped from its owner last Monday, wandered about aimlessly and bit five students on the College campus who tried to befriended it. After its capture it died and its head was sent to Harrisburg, where the diagnosis was made. The students at once began receiving treatment.

In the week two more students who were bitten by dogs began treatments.

Because the dog may have bitten other dogs in its wanderings, dog owners are warned to watch for symptoms of nervousness, excitability, a queer growl, and a desire to snap at things.

Dog-owners may have pets inoculated against the disease for a comparatively small fee.

Rabies is transmitted in humans, is often fatal. A person bitten by any dog should see to it that the dog, even if apparently normal, is kept under observation for at least ten days, for it may have the infection in its early stages, authorities said.

Persons receiving the Patient treatment may go about their usual activities without any ill effects in most cases, physicians said. The treatments are not painful, consisting solely of injections.

4-H Clubs Seek to Strengthen Work

National Mobilization Week To Be Observed Here April 5 to 11

Seeking to strengthen 4-H club work on a national basis, a National 4-H Mobilization Week will be observed April 5 to 11, announces County Agent R. C. Blancy.

The National 4-H Victory Program will be emphasized in every community by the local 4-H Club and a concerted effort will be made to reach every young person eligible for a 4-H membership.

Looking ahead, the plan includes National 4-H Achievement Week in the late fall when, in every community, the results of the work done will be publicized and goals set for the ensuing year.

First suggestion for a National 4-H Mobilization Week came from Ohio. The National 4-H Executive Committee unanimously approved the idea. Then it was approved by Director H. C. Ramsower, chairman of the Extension Committee on Organization and Policy of the Land-Grant College Association.

Much activity is under way in mobilizing the one and a half million members in the National 4-H Club Victory Program.

While details of the plan to be followed in Pennsylvania for the observance of the National 4-H Mobilization Week are still in the making, it is expected that they will include a mobilization meeting for each club, providing an opportunity for the press, radio, window displays, circulars, magazines, 4-H rallies, and other 4-H events to tell the story of what is being done and what goals are set.

In addition, the 4-H Mobilization Week will provide opportunity for generating enthusiasm and national unity among rural boys and girls for participation in the National 4-H Club Victory Program.

This program, among other goals, includes the production and conservation of needed food supplies, saving and gathering needed scrap materials, development of health, acquiring useful skills, practicing democratic procedures, and studying important social and economic forces now at work.

Reser is reported to have been on vacation for several weeks from his regular job of tending the beacon near Woodward, Centre county.

Reser, a former resident of Bellefonte, was quite well known in this area. He came here about 20 years ago from Washington, D. C., to enter the employ of the Titan Signal Company as stenographer and bookkeeper. He remained in that post for several months only, resigning to accept a position with the American Lime and Stone Company. After a period of service there he accepted a position at Rockview penitentiary and after having been there for about six months was offered and accepted a job with the Pennsylvania Railroad in Tyrone.

About 15 years ago he gave up railroading and became a beacon keeper, an occupation in which he
