#### PENN STATE FINDS SOIL IS AIDED BY PHOSPHATE

A 20-year comparative test of phosphate fertilizers at the Pennsylvania State College Agricultural Experiment Station reveals that phosphoric acid is the first need of Hagrstown silt loam, a common soi type in the central part of the state. Crops grown in rotation were corn, oats, wheat, and mixed clover and timothy. The fertilizers were applied in alternate years to the corn and


