What's in a name? Dr. Cutts is a surgeon, Dr. Toothman is a dentist, and Dr. Foote is a chiropodist.

Dr. David Marine, of Ohio, is interested in the sea. His interest in fish aided him in discovering an important fact about goiter.

He demonstrated that goiter in brook trout could be prevented by periodically putting iodine into the water.

This naturally led him to investigate the use of iodine for humans to prevent goiter in certain sections of the country.

In all fairness to the Chinese it should be mentioned that they used iodine for the prevention and treatment of goiter more than 3,500 years ago.

Goiter is caused by a disturbance in the function of the thyroid gland.

Lack of iodine in food or water tends to interfere with proper functioning of this gland.

In some sections of the world, chiefly in those parts far from the sea, there is an absence of iodine in the soil and water.

Switzerland, notably, had a vast amount of goiter among its people.

After Dr. Marine's experiments with iodine, laws were passed in Switzerland making it compulsory to use iodized salt for all domestic purposes.

The use of iodine for the prevention of goiter is now well established.

Where goiter is prevalent appropriate amounts of iodine may be given to children in the form of iodized salt.

Iodine may also be given to patients just prior to surgical operation to remove a toxic goiter.

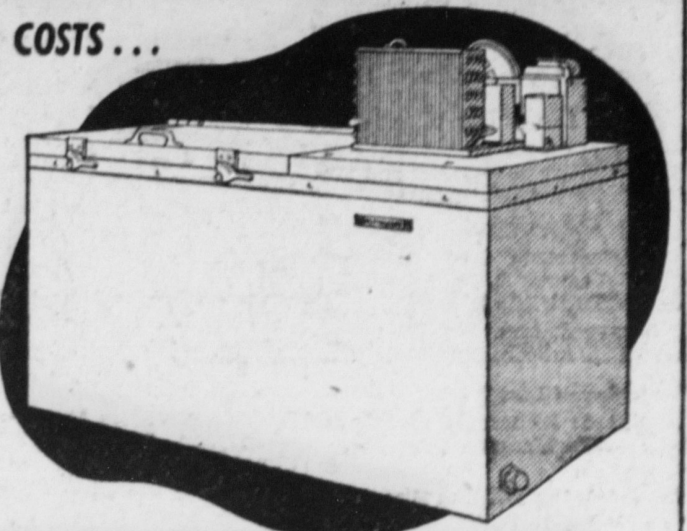
The ancients obtained their iodine from sponges taken from the sea. Dr. Marine re-discovered this old treatment.

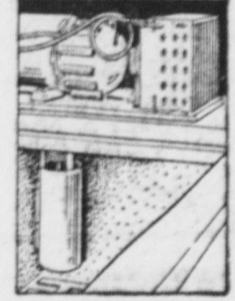
