Michael Hajzak, 85, died Saturday, March 28, 1942, at the Centre County Home at Bellefonte. He lived nearly all his life in Rush township, near the Osceola Mills railroad station. He was born in Czechoslovakia. The following three children survive him: Michael and Mrs. Joseph Beres, Osceola Mills; and Mrs. Mary Michalonko, Cleveland, Ohio. A brother, Peter, also lives at Cleveland. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at the St. John the Baptist Greek Catholic church at Hawk Run. Interment was made in the church cemetery.

MRS. SARAH PETERS
Mrs. Sarah (Ingram) Peters, widow of William A. Peters, died at 4:45 o'clock Thursday morning, March 26, 1942, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. B. Dell, in Juniata. She would have been 90 years old April 1. Born April 1, 1852 at Unionville, she was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Ingram. Members of her family include these children: Mrs. Lida Hoover, California; Mrs. E. B. Dell, Juniata, and Roy G. Peters, Arvada, Colo. Also surviving are a number of grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Harriet Stere, of Dayton, Pa. Mrs. Peters was a member of the Unionville Baptist church. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at Juniata, after which the remains were brought to Unionville and interred in Oak Ridge cemetery.

WILLARD J. BRIDGE
Willard J. Bridge, nephew of Mrs. Elsie H. Noll and Mrs. W. H. Kaufman, both of State College, died at 6:30 a. m. Saturday, March 28, 1942, of a cerebral hemorrhage in the Rochester, N. Y. hospital. He was 43. The deceased was born near Jacksonville June 19, 1898, a son of William E. and Annie Hoy Bridge. His mother preceded him in death last June. His wife, Mary Kathryn, and daughter, Ramona, survive. In addition to Mrs. Noll and Mrs. Kaufman, two aunts and two uncles survive. Mr. Bridge was employed by the New York Central Railroad as chief clerk in the office at Rochester. Short funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. at the Noll home in State College, followed by services in the Reformed church at Jacksonville, with Rev. John R. Olick officiating.

WILLIAM J. S. COWDRICK
William J. S. Cowdrick, Bellefonte native and for many years associated with his father in the building contracting industry here, died at his home in Niagara Falls, N. Y., shortly after noon Thursday, March 26, 1942, following a long period of illness. His remains were brought to Bellefonte on the Saturday afternoon train and burial made in Union cemetery. Surviving him are his wife, the former Josephine Shrom; a son, John W. Cowdrick; a daughter, Mrs. J. Albert Carlin, and one brother, C. Edward Cowdrick, all of Niagara Falls. William Cowdrick was the son of the late Morris and Mary (Ruffhead) Cowdrick and was born in Bellefonte. In early manhood he joined his father in the building industry, the firm specializing in brick construction work. After the Johnstown flood in 1889, the construction firm, headed by his father, rebuilt a good portion of the destroyed city. In 1895 Mr. Cowdrick went to Niagara Falls to start a brickyard in the projected bustling community of Modeltown. He and his family were followed by Mr. Cowdrick's father, who moved to Niagara Falls shortly before the turn of the century to launch a construction firm. For many years Mr. Cowdrick was associated with his father and brothers in the company formed by the former and, as advancing age caused the father to become less active, the firm became known as the W. J. S. Cowdrick Construction Company. Many prominent buildings were erected during the lifetime of the firm. After the construction company which bore his name was dissolved in 1916, Mr. Cowdrick served as construction superintendent and, occasionally, brick-laying foreman for other firms, and it was in the former capacity

that he supervised the erection of several buildings at the plant of the Kimberly-Clark corporation, Packard road. As one of the city's leading contractors, he was president of Niagara Falls Builders' Association for a number of years. During his lifetime Mr. Cowdrick had been affiliated with the Masonic Lodge, Knights Templar, Knights of Pythias, and the Royal Arcanum. He also was a past president of the Sons of St. George, in which he held membership at the time of his death.

MRS. LESTER C. MILLER
Mrs. Ethel Frank Miller, 48, wife of Lester C. Miller, and a sister of Mrs. Edith Fuller, of State College, died at her home in Williamsport, Saturday, March 28. Besides her husband, she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George A. Frank, a son, C. LeRoy, of Reading; a daughter, Mrs. William D. Schrader, of Philadelphia; two brothers and the sister above named.

AUGUST OLICK
August Olick, of Julian, R. D., died at the Centre County Hospital here Sunday, March 29, 1942. He had been admitted to the institution the previous day. Mr. Olick, aged about 70 years, was a former resident of Clearfield. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock this Tuesday morning at the Wetzel Memorial Chapel, Milesburg, with Rev. L. F. Sheets in charge. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

JOHN HENRY BRUMBAUGH
John Henry Brumbaugh, a veteran of the Altona works, died at his home in Altona, Saturday morning, March 28. Born at Allegheny Furnace, October 28, 1869, he was a son of Jacob and Nancy (Davis) Brumbaugh and had resided all his life within a radius of 100 feet in Pleasant Valley (Altona), December 22, 1887. He married Miss Edith Pheasant at her home in Mt. Eagle, Centre county. The couple celebrated their fifty-fourth wedding anniversary last December. Mr. Brumbaugh retired in March, 1932, as a boiler maker for the Pennsylvania Railroad after 45 years of service. Members of his family include his wife and seven children.

Mrs. Rebecca Elizabeth Smith, 54, of Scotchtown, near Snow Shoe, died at 4 o'clock Thursday morning, March 23, 1942. In the Clearfield Hospital of complications following a year's illness.
