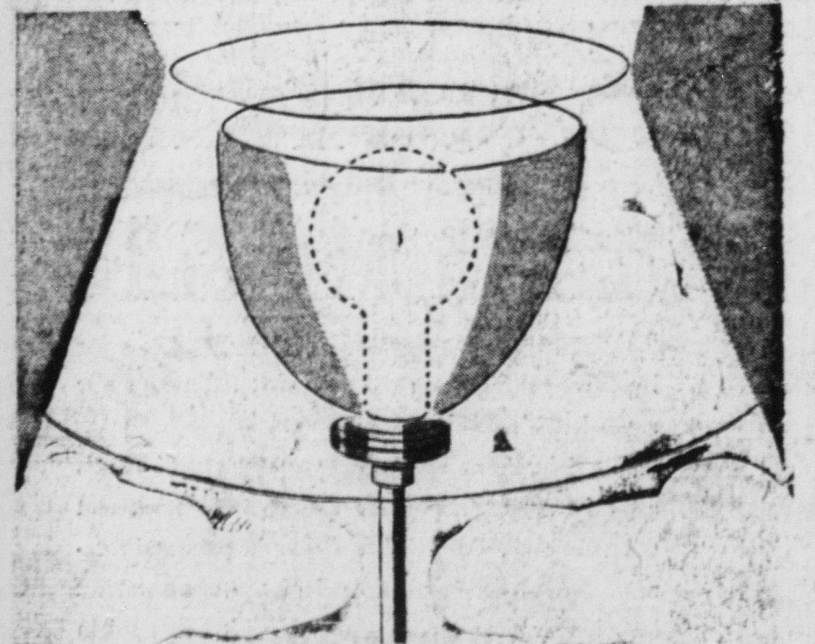


SNYDERTOWN
