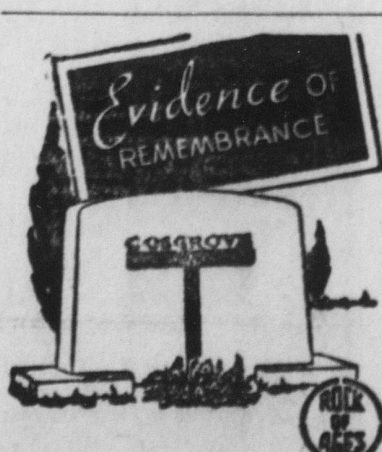
JOHN H. WOLFORT

A non-habit-forming substitute for morphine, a major goal of medicine for many years, was announced to the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, at Boston. The new drug is synthetic, that is, an artificially-made substance.

The morphine substitute was made in effect by taking something resembling atrophine and changing it into something resembling morphine. The new synthetic is said to get rid of heart depression and takes on the pain relief of morphine.

Monday brushing out a right of way for the Pennsylvania Electric Company to erect power lines. District Manager Warren E. Townsend stated that within the next 10 days a crew of 45 men will be working on this job to rush it to completion. The company will supply the airfield with 2400 volts and the seven-mile line is being constructed so that a load of 4600 volts can be sent in if necessary.

The power will be used for field lighting, boundary lights, ceiling lights, beacon, teletype, pumps and the many machines which will be necessary. A special type of transformer has been ordered for the job.

young mother told newsmen in broken English from her hospital bed. She said that after the baby was born she placed him inside her dress to shelter him from the cold. Her legs were badly bruised when she fell while making her way to the deck with Viana in her arms after the torpedo struck.

Conley related. After the baby was born, the doctor said, "We took a turban from another woman in the boat and wrapped the baby in it." He said the 24 persons in the boat had given their blankets to other survivors on a raft and the only cover available for Mrs. Mohorovic was a sail which was stretched across one end of the boat.

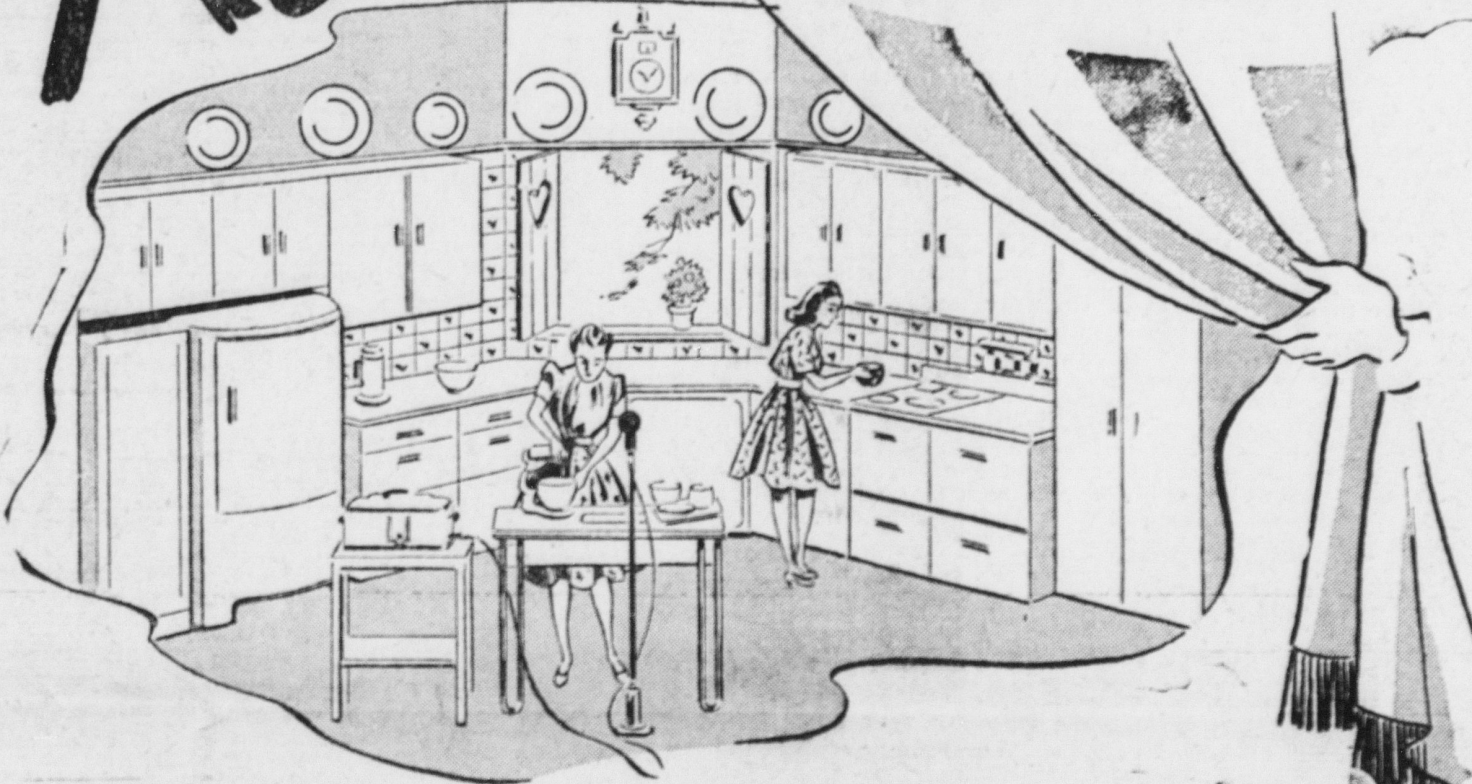
When their rescue ship came alongside the lifeboat, one of the crewmen handed the naked baby up to a seaman on the deck of the rescue vessel. "I have never seen an expression on anyone's face like that seaman," Dr. Conley said.
