Anglers will be able to fish on Spring Creek only from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m., despite a request by the Spring Creek Landowners Association for fishing hours from 5 a. m. to 10 p. m., according to a letter received from C. A. French, commissioner of fisheries.

Mr. French pointed out that conflicting fishing hours on the various sections of the stream last year made a complicated situation which led to a number of arrests. In order to avoid a repetition of the situation this season, the board decided on a uniform set of regulations.

The Landowners' group had sought the 5 a. m. opening time to fish in the early morning hours, and because that is the only time some fishermen can get an opportunity to pursue that sport.

Herbert M. Beezer, in charge of the Bellefonte civilian defense volunteer police, reported that classes will be held every Thursday evening at the Elks Home, West High street, when police will be given instructions in their duties and responsibilities.

Capt William Dennis, of the Penn State Campus police, will be the instructor.

There are approximately 50 volunteer police in this area. Under a law enacted in 1917 such police have broad powers, including the right to arrest on sight, with or without a warrant, any person apprehended in the committing of an offense. The Bellefonte police were sponsored by Mayor Hardman P. Harris and their credentials are signed by Chief of Police Harry Dukeman.
