Council Faces Revenue Drop

on the report is 28 mills, of which 3 mills represented the levy imposed by the poor overseers, and which had nothing to do with the borough government being handled as a separate account. The borough poor levy was discontinued in 1938 when the countywide institution district was established. The poor levy since then has been a county tax, instead of borough.

At Monday's session Mr. Carpenter told council that it requires from \$30,000 to \$40,000 a year to operate the borough government.

The re-location of the curb market on the diamond includes an increase of from 10 cents to 20 cents a day fee from each market dealer to make up for revenue which might be lost through the operation of parking meters on the diamond. The dealers will ignore the parking meters, but each one will be required to pay a fee of 20 cents for "rental" of the space on market days.

Council authorized the special committee to invite representatives of the Westinghouse Electric Company to give a local demonstration of a newly developed air horn for use as air raid warning signals. The horns, small in size, operate effectively on air supplied by small compressors such as are maintained in most garages for inflating tires. It is believed that three of the horns would be sufficient for Bellefonte, and since they cost \$65 each, the total cost would be something less than \$200. After the war emergency the horns could be used as fire alarms, and have the advantage that they could be arranged to give coded signals for different types of alarm.

Charles Kellerman, recently appointed by Council to serve in the chair vacated by Councilman John Weber, of the South Ward, was sworn into office by Mayor Hardman P. Harris. Mr. Kellerman was named chairman of the market committee, and Russell Lambert was shifted from chairman of the market committee to chairman of the street committee—a post held by Mr. Weber. Mr. Kellerman also was named as a member of the town improvement and special committees in Mr. Weber's place.

Field Supervisor To Meet Farmers

Joseph C. Myers, field supervisor for the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office, advises that he will be at Port Matilda, at the post office on April 21 at 1 p. m. for the purpose of receiving applications and talking with farmers desiring to discuss with him their plans for financing their farming operations for 1942.

Mr. Myers also advises that W. C. Armstrong, deputy recorder of deeds located at Bellefonte, will receive applications on those days that the supervisor is not in the county. This will mean that farmers may make applications for an emergency crop and feed loan any week day instead of having to wait the visit of the supervisor to this county.

"Loans are made up to \$400 and carry an interest rate of 4 per cent, and are available to those farmers who are eligible," Mr. Myers stated.

It is a policy of the Emergency Crop and Feed Office to lend no more than is actually needed in order that the farmer may be enabled to carry out his program and conveniently repay from his farming operations.

Good Bed Conducive to Needed Relaxation

A comfortable bed is essential for the rest and relaxation that we need today, points out Mrs. Helen S. Butler, home economics extension representative of Centre county.

The comfort of a bed will depend on the springs and mattress. Good springs will support the weight of the body without sagging. The most desirable mattress is one that is firm enough to support the body yet soft enough to conform to every curve and movement of the sleeper. To give best service, a mattress should be of good material and workmanship.

Among other factors that contribute to the comfort of a bed are attractive lightweight bed coverings that are resistant in size and easy to clean. Because a bed is moved frequently, it should be light, but firm and substantial.

For orderliness and ease of cleaning the bedroom, it is necessary to provide ample storage for bedding. If closets were overlooked when the house was built, they may be put in now at a small cost.

Miss Butler has suggestions for planning and equipping either permanent or temporary closets. If you would like help, write or phone your request to her at the Agricultural Extension Office in Bellefonte.

Grants New Trial In Highway Case

Bickles was considered at a recent court trial and the jury awarded the plaintiffs a verdict of \$3000 with the understanding that the plaintiffs would make certain changes as the result of the highway change.

The Highway Department, considering the verdict high, appealed for a new trial. At the original trial, witnesses for the plaintiffs pleaded damage at from \$2500 to \$3500, while witnesses for the Highway Department estimated damage at \$255.

In granting the new trial, the court points out that the jury, which was instructed to arrive at the amount of damage by determining the difference in the value of the farm before and after the strip of road was taken, had apparently included in the verdict an additional item of damages for making certain changes.

The judge pointed out that the cost of making changes in such cases could exceed the original value of the property and in that event the verdict might be larger than the original value of the farm.

Concluding, Judge Walker's opinion set forth that in order to avoid a possibility of injustice being done, the parties interested will be given another opportunity to present their cases to a jury for a new determination of the issue.

Save Farm Tires—Careful Use of Tires on Farm Tractors, Trucks, and Buses

Timely reminders from the Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Save Farm Tires—Careful use of tires on farm tractors, trucks, and buses is imperative, agricultural engineers of the Pennsylvania State College point out. The enemies of rubber tires are underinflation, overinflation, slippage, open cuts or breaks, grease, oil, clinders, manure, careless operation, wheels out of alignment, and faulty brakes. Care in these matters will save tires.

Feed Hungry Bees—A heavy sugar syrup may be used for feeding hungry bees. Specialists at the Pennsylvania State College say. The syrup is made from 2 1/2 parts of sugar and 1 part of water, both by measure. Heat until the sugar is dissolved and then cool before feeding in an inverted honey can.

Plan Home Recreation—Deliberate Planning of such activities as home-made games and puzzles, music, reading, bird study, handicrafts, and hobbies of many kinds is a means of giving expression to talent and enriching the family life, according to rural sociologists at the Pennsylvania State College.

Grow More Peas—Increased yields of peas can be obtained through good preparation and proper condition of the seedbed at planting time, according to Penn State gardening specialists.

Control Sheep Parasites—For the treatment of internal parasites of sheep, the drug phenothiazine is being used with effective results, report livestock specialists of the Pennsylvania State College.

Produce Ryegrass Seed—Present favorable prices for ryegrass seed may encourage Pennsylvania farmers to produce seed for the market, according to Penn State agronomists.

ended. The service men who have been "guests" here have gone away singing the praises of Bellefonte's hospitality.

It has been suggested that the town get the thing on a business-like basis—that the Chamber of Commerce, civic, and fraternal organizations set up a small fund to be used for providing shelter and breakfast to service men who find themselves stranded in town.

It is not the intention or aim of officials to enter into the thing on a large-scale basis, for there's no need for such a course. Several dollars a week should take care of all deserving cases.

Here's the way one police officer put it: "A couple of sailors on their way to Altoona landed in town about 1 a. m. They were shivering with cold and hadn't eaten for some hours. They asked me if I knew of anyone going to Altoona.

"When I told them I didn't, they asked for a night's lodging. I didn't want to take them to the lockup to spend the night, so I got them a room at a hotel and paid for it myself," he continued.

"Those guys, many of them, gave up good jobs to take a \$21 a month job in the armed forces to protect the rest of us. When they ask for a night's lodging, I'm not going to put them in the lockup with bums and drunks!"

requirements for productive gardens, including choice and variety of seeds; the best times for planting; how to take care of garden properly; what fertilizers to use, and other helpful suggestions.

During the season it is planned to have a corps of expert local gardeners to act in an advisory capacity to beginners and others who need help and advice. Mr. Keeler said.

Keeler pointed out that unless a garden is planted, planned, and cared for properly it is useless to waste the seed it requires. However, he added, a garden properly conducted will return substantial dividends on the original investment. In addition, he said, food will play an important part in winning the war. Every pound of food produced in Victory Gardens means a pound of food released for the use of our armed forces of all our allies, he added.

For persons interested are urged to attend the meeting next Tuesday. Some garden tools, seeds and fertilizer will be awarded during the evening as door prizes.

Not Tolerate Damage To Parking Meters

Chief of Police Harry Dukeman, of Bellefonte, calls attention to the provisions of the parking meter ordinance which provides fines of from 50 cents to \$50 and costs, or imprisonment in the County jail for ten days for anyone who defaces, tampers with, damages, opens, willfully breaks, destroys or otherwise impairs the usefulness of any parking meters.
