### Teachers Granted Pay Increases

(Continued from page one)  
war conditions the committee recommends special compensation of \$50 for the current year for every regular school employe except that married men teachers receiving less than the average teachers' salary of \$1,334, shall receive \$100. These amounts shall be disbursed before July 6th at the convenience of the School Board.

(b) For the purpose of determining salary increments for the ensuing year on a basis that will be fair and equitable to all members of the instructional and administrative staff of the school district, the committee finds it necessary to establish certain maximum salary limits as follows, the first figures being Third Class District requirements compared with Bellefonte District maximum:

- a. Supervis. Prin. No req'tmt \$3,500
- b. High School Prin. 2,500 2,500
- c. High School Teach. 1,600 1,800
- d. Elementary 1,400 1,500

Minimum high school salary is \$2,000; 4 annual increments of \$100 are required making final minimum \$2,400. Minimum elementary salary is \$1,000; 4 annual increments of \$100 are required making final minimum \$1,400. Minimum high school principal's salary is \$2,000; 4 annual increments of \$125 are required, making final minimum \$2,500.

(c) The committee recommends that increases in teachers' salaries for the coming school year be based in general, on the principle of \$60 for women and unmarried men and \$120 for married men, except (1) where such increments will result in a salary greater than the school district maximum as stated above or (2) where greater increments are required by law.

(d) The committee recommends as a general policy that salary increases above those required by law shall be based upon (a) satisfactory service, (b) continued college study, (c) length of service, and (d) co-operativeness.

The salary increases for the entire year 1941-1942 will be included in the regular May salary checks, while the increases for the year 1942-43 will be divided into twelve equal payments which will be included in the regular monthly salary checks issued to teachers and other employes, it was explained.

The tax rate for the ensuing year was unanimously approved when it was explained that the new budget is based upon the same levels as for the year now ending.

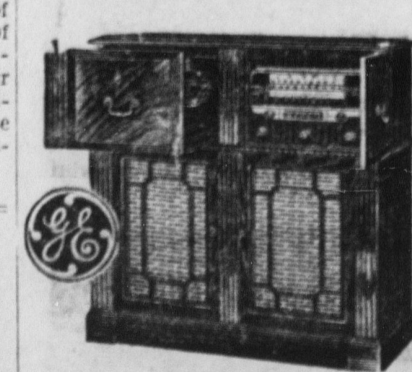
