RAYMOND LYKENS

Funeral services for Raymond Lykens, aged 4 months and 18 days, son of George and Mary Ellen Bennett Lykens, of Fleming, were held Monday at the Salvation Army hall in Tyrone with Envoy John Smith officiating. Interment was made in the Grandview cemetery, Tyrone. The child died Saturday, April 11, 1942, at his parental home after a few days' illness with pneumonia. Surviving are the parents and three brothers, Kenneth, George, Jr., and Earl, all at home.

MRS. MARGARET ELLEN HARM

Mrs. Margaret Ellen Harm, of near Mt. Eagle, died at 2:20 o'clock Sunday afternoon, April 12, 1942, at the home of her sisters, Mrs. Harriet Aikey and Mrs. Molly Leathers, at Holters Crossing between Curtin and Mt. Eagle, after a year's illness. The immediate cause of death was given as pneumonia, from which she had suffered for about a week. Mrs. Harm was a daughter of Jacob and Harriet Malone Leathers and was born near Howard on October 29, 1860, making her age at time of death 81 years, 5 months, and 13 days. Her husband, George Harm, preceded her in death. Surviving in addition to the sisters at whose home she died, is a nephew, Albert Avey of Bellwood, whom she raised. Mrs. Harm was a lifelong member of the Curtin Methodist church. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Neff funeral home in Howard, with the Rev. Wallace Cummings of Howard, officiating. Interment was made in the Curtin cemetery.

GEORGE BAIR

George Bair, of Harrisburg, husband of the former Rosalie Yearick, of Bellefonte, died suddenly at the Harrisburg Hospital at 4:40 o'clock Saturday morning, April 11, 1942, of a heart attack and diabetes. He had been admitted to the hospital at 1:30 o'clock the same morning. Mr. Bair was quite well known in Bellefonte through frequent visits with Mrs. Bair's brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde G. Swartz, of East Logan street. Surviving in addition to his wife, are an infant daughter, Alice Ann; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Bair, of Harrisburg; two brothers and four sisters. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at the Charles C. Baker funeral home in Harrisburg with Rev. J. Paul Brennan of the Mackay street Church of God, Harrisburg, officiating. The body was brought to the Jacksonville cemetery, this county, for interment.

JAMES IRVIN BRYAN

James Irvin Bryan, one of the county's well known musicians, died at 4:30 o'clock Monday morning, April 13, 1942, at his home in Curtin after a year's illness with a complication of diseases. Mr. Bryan had been bedfast for about a month. Deceased was a son of Roland and Anna Cartwright Bryan and was born at Curtin on June 13, 1869, making his age at time of death 72 years and 10 months. Surviving are his wife, the former Melissa Barber; two sons, Raymond, of Elmira, N. Y., and William, of Bellefonte; two brothers, Orlando C. Bryan, of Milesburg, and John W. of Howard; a sister, Mrs. Harry Lose, of Philadelphia; 4 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Mr. Bryan was one of the few surviving employees of the old Iron Works at Curtin. In later years he had been employed by the American Lime and Stone Company and several years ago suffered the loss of a hand in an accident while at work. During his lifetime he had been a member of many Centre county bands, including the Curtin, Howard, and Milesburg organizations. He was a lifelong member of the Curtin Methodist church and for more than 20 years was Sunday school superintendent there.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Curtin Methodist church with the Rev. Wallace Cummings officiating. Interment was made in the Curtin cemetery.

FRANK M. REAM

Frank M. Ream, 75, a painter in Boalsburg for more than 30 years, died at his home in Boalsburg at 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning, April 15, 1942, of complications. Mr. Ream was born February 19, 1867 at Spring Mills, a son of George and Lucy Houtz Ream. He is survived by his wife, the former Anna Spayd, and these children: George W. of Schuylkill Haven; Vilas S., of State College; Beatrice A., Boalsburg, and Charles E., Doylestown. One brother, John, of Harrisburg, also survives. The deceased was a member of the Boalsburg Reformed church. Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Boalsburg Reformed church, with Rev. T. G. Jones officiating. Interment will take place at Koch's funeral home in State College, Friday from 7 to 9 p. m.

ed by Pvt. Paul T. Ruda, of the State Motor Police at Rockview substation.

Loot in the Millheim robbery was said to be \$40 in cash and 10 cartons of cigarettes. In the Coburn robbery a tire, wheel, tube, jack, generator, fan, keys and a tool kit were taken.

No additional prosecutions are expected to be made against the two men. Clarence Auman was sentenced to serve from 3 to 6 years in the Western Penitentiary upon his plea of guilty Monday of last week to other thefts in this area.

A search of the home of Clarence Auman brought to light a considerable number of tires that were stolen in six counties.

Police said the recovering of the tires cleared up at least eight thefts in Centre county and a number in Mifflin, Union, Montour, Clinton and Columbia counties. A number of the tires were stolen in the vicinity of State College and Boalsburg and several were taken near Coburn.

Pvt. John Eisenhoth, who led the investigation, said that all of the tires have not been recovered but that questioning revealed that many of the thefts were committed by Clarence Auman and Nevin Auman. Nevin admitted that the tires were stolen by Clarence and himself in a statement given to Pvt. Eisenhoth.

Last Wednesday when police made a search of Clarence Auman's property in Penn township, they found tires hidden in his house, summer house, attic, and straw mow. Police have received no complaints to correspond with some of the recovered tires. Persons who have had tires stolen from them are asked to get in touch with police at the Rockview barracks.
