EDITORIAL

It is hard to reconcile the beauty of spring with the horrors of warfare but it's the same world,

We understand that marriages are increasing, which probably reflects the influence of men in uni-

The United States is in its present plight because we did not follow the wise advice, "In time of peace, prepare for war."

There are some people who think they are making a major war effort if they cut down on sugar and buy a war bond occasionally.

The boys of Centre county are responding to the call of the nation and the least that we can do at home is to uphold them and their cause.

We have no sympathy for the people who are spreading suspicion about Russia, Britain and China, These nations are fighting with us and they deserve our unlimited support.

So far as the Centre Democrat is concerned, we will uphold the strong right arm of the President, during this war, as the Commander-in-Chief of the armed forces of the nation. For the duration at least, we will not try to be smart about matters of which we know little or nothing.

The sinking of two British cruisers in the Indian Ocean seems to indicate the Japanese have something, and they have. The answer is, superior force. Almost every Japanese advance has been scored against inferior numbers and victories in the air and on the sea have been the result of superior numbers, more than anything else. Sooner or later, the scale will be more than balanced and the Jap fighting man will appear in his true perspective.

It is possible that when gasoline is again returned to us in plenteous quantities it will be in improved form. The automobile will use 100-octane aviation gasoline. The post-war car of the future will require less fuel per ton-mile and will have a smaller gasoline tank and engine but greater efficiency. That is the answer to the question of what will be done after the war with the \$500,000,000 facilities being developed for making 100-octane gaso-

By federal edict canned soups are limited to twenty-one kinds. And some people are kicking about it. It is not hard to remember when there were only two soups, vegetable and bean, and we thrived on 'em. Anyone whose taste cannot get along on twentyone kinds of soups has a taste which is out of gear and a hundred kinds of soups would not satisfy

A HUGE BUT NOT FUTILE TASK

As this is written, the American flag still floats defiantly over Corregidor. The heroic forces of American and Filipino fighters driven to their last defenses by the ten-to-one Japanese advance in the Bataan Peninsula, have set a standard of courage, tenacity and determination that ranks them among the classic fighters of all the ages.

The military authorities tell us that the sad outcome of Bataan was inevitable. But it has cost the enemy a terrific price and the stubborn resistance to the flood of yellow warriors has given precious time for the Allies to get their forces in order, and it is probable that the heroism of the men under MacArthur and Wainwright has prevented the conquest of Australia, and thereby has given us the springboard from which must proceed the movement that will drive the Japanese back, step by step, over the road of their conquests.

The arm-chair military critics, in and out of safe editorial sanctums, are harping on the failure to provide reinforcements and supplies in adequate proportions, implying grave criticism because this was not afforded. The Army and Navy people, who know what is possible and what is impossible in a military way, testify that everything that could be

General Douglas MacArthur, who in the estimation of all Americans knows that situation better than any other human being, is the commander-inchief of the South Pacific forces. The Philippine theater is still within his jurisdiction. Does anybody suppose that if anything could have been done to relieve the desperate plight of the men who were under his direct command for so long, that he would not have taken the requisite action? Does anybody imagine that if this magnificent general had recommended a course of action, that that course would

not have been taken? The whole world that is fighting the onrush of the totalitarian powers wondered at the miracles that first MacArthur and then Wainwright have per-

formed and these untold millions of people cudgled their brains in vain for a process that would have relieved those magnificent garrisons.

Baatan was a tough blow, but the American people are not discouraged by it. It emphasizes the difficulties of the task in which we are engaged, but it has only reinforced the determination of an ultimate victory which involves the downfall of Hitlerism and the relegation of Japan to the rank of a second or third-rate power, for the treacherous yellow horde has demonstrated its unfitness for a place among the civilized nations.

Japan like Germany, is fighting for no ideals. Their activities are devoted to the sole purpose of conquest, and in the pursuit of that purpose they recognize no neutrals. They are out to get whatever force can win for them—the American Philippines, the Dutch East Indies, the British possessions, or such incidental pieces of real estate as French Indo

They have the advantage of geography, of intense preparation, and the circumstance that the Occidental countries are locked in bitter strife, which under circums ances have made their initial victories possible. Nobody knows what this has cost the yellow empire in men and materials. She has sacrificed thousands and thousands of Japanese boys, deliberately hurling them to destruction in the attainment of objectives.

This cannot go on indefinitely, and will not go on. Her ruthless desperation will be matched with equal determination. Most wars are susceptible to a negotiated peace. This one is to the death.

However long may be the struggle, however bitter may be the sacrifices, the powers of evil have to be crushed, and will be crushed.

1942 TO WITNESS AXIS BID FOR VICTORY

The initiative in 1942 belongs to the Axis; Germany and Japan will select the areas of combat while the United States, seeking to be strong anywhere, may not be strong enough anywhere to meet the impact of stupendous offensives.

Germany, despite unexpected casualties in Russia, holds essential strong points for renewing the effort to destroy the Red Army. The cil of the Caucasus and a junction with Japanese forces may be worth more than the capture of Leningrad and

The feverish drive for men to replace workers drawn into the Nazi armies, reported from satellite nations and occupied areas, may not represent a desperate attempt to maintain production. It may be the means of enabling Hitler to stage simultaneous offensives against Russia, in the Mediterranean area against Malta, Cyprus, Syria and, if necessary, Turkey, and, at the same time, assault the British keystone in Egypt from two directions.

Hitler Grasps Last Opportunity

Hitler has not won his great war. Amazing victories leave German and dominated areas closely penned in Europe. The encircling ring must be broken to gain victory and, threatened by the slowly growing power of his adversaries, the Nazi leader undoubtedly recognizes 1942 as his best, if last, opportunity. German leaders know that if Germany and Japan, at their peak of advantage, cannot triumph against relatively unprepared antagonists this year, the war is definitely and irretrievably lost,

Consequently, Germany will assemble her greatest possible force to smash toward a decision, Four million men from twenty countries and nine million women workers will be augmented by Frenchmen regimented by Laval. They have released German men to fight and offset losses in Russia, estimated at more than three million casualties. Since December began, other than defensive fighting in Russia, the Nazis have been preparing for their supreme military endeavor, which will probably reveal unsuspected power and danger.

Japan Pursues Hope of Triumph

Japanese successes in Burma threaten to isolate China from her source of supplies, which might prove disastrous to Chiang Kai-shek's military oprations Cut off from her friends China would face a desperate peril, especially if Japan turns from India and Australia to seek an end to the "China incident." Already the Japs have gained rich areas for exploitation and assimilation.

Like Germany, the Japs, despite great successes, must go on. They cannot risk defensive strategy so long as powerful enemies grow stronger. They must destroy all possible opposition to secure their illgotten gains and, like Hitler, they realize that the opportunity of 1942 will fade away. Consequently, we must expect the Japanese, although interested only in themselves, to coordinate their campaign with that of Hitler.

The Japanese will probably not attack Australia although efforts will be made to cut communication with the United States. This would prevent utilization of the island continent as a base for attacking the Japanese bank. China will be left for later liquidation, even if cut off, and Japan will seek a junction with Germany, attacking India, where native populations may give fifth-column assistance, and exploiting to its fullest power her sea-and-air com-

Sea-Supremacy at Stake

In the 1942 plans of Germany and Japan there is a design to destroy the sea-power supremacy of the United Nations. This means the British and American beets, which even now enable supplies to reach Australia, the Near East, Great Britain and Russia. If these transportation routes are lost the Axis enemies will be isolated and destroyed, one by

So far, the Allied navies have been in the open, protecting convoys and holding the high seas. Naturally, they have been subjected to attack and losses. Aircraft and U-boats have preyed upon warships under conditions extremely favorable to the attack but the Axis has carefully guarded its heavy fleet units, anticipating the day when it can risk a decisive engagement.

Axis Has a Chance at Sea!

Not generally appreciated is the challenge to our control of the seas. Axis naval building programs culminate this year and, if French warships are given to Hitler, the margin of our superiority will be exceedingly thin in 1942. Space does not permit detailed analysis of naval strength nor of naval operational problems but it is certainly true that the United Nations do not enjoy unquestionable safety

The issue does not depend upon the plane-versus-ship argument, although strength in aircraft carriers has been a major factor in Japanese successes. In time, we will have ships and planes, ready for any form of warfare but the danger lies in the fact that our sea position is insecure now.

A NEW FRONT IN EUROPE

The visit of the American Chief-of-Staff, General Marshall to London, has revived speculation as to the opening of a new front in Western Europe. This is a ticklish problem. It must be solved professional military men of the United States and Great Britain. would be the beginning of the end. However, it would be utterly foolish for Great Britain and the United States to open up a Western front in Europe without adequate men, materiel and shipping. The theory of taking risks to acquire gains is sound, but before competent military men will approve such an expeditionary force, there must be a probable chance of success

Otherwise, Dunquerque would be repeated upon a larger scale and what might be the basis of decisive power in 1943 might be frittered away in a premature effort in 1942.
