Barley Oldest Food Barley is said to be the oldest food of man; one, the sacred barley of the ancients, was known to the lake dwellers of Switzerland.

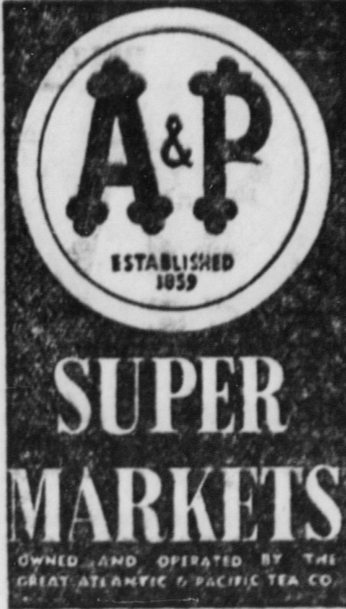
First Woman Doctor
