two, and anglers must stop fishing after the second trout has been killed. Trout must be at least ten inches long in the main portion of the Paradise, although seven-inch catches will be legal in the woman's section.

Only artificial flies with barbless hooks or regular flies with barbs removed may be used in the preserve. Spinners or any form of live bait are prohibited.

Anglers owning Pennsylvania licenses may fish five days in the Paradise. Violations of any of the rules may entail a fine of \$20, revocation of the angler's license, and confiscation of equipment.

Shortage of cars and gasoline, together with the fact that many anglers are employed and will be unable to obtain leaves of absence are expected to reduce the number of anglers to visit the Paradise this year considerably below last year's peak of 20,000.

Four O'Leary Brothers In Armed Forces

With three sons now in the service with a fourth to report for duty May 16, Mrs. Daniel P. O'Leary, of North Penn street, Bellefonte, soon will be eligible for the Four-Star Emblem of Honor, awarded by the Emblem of Honor Association of New York, in recognition of mothers who have more than the average number of sons in the armed forces.

The O'Leary brothers now in service are: Lawrence and Paul, twin brothers, aged 18, and their older brother, Daniel, Lawrence and Paul enlisted in the Air Corps, while Daniel was drawn through Selective Service.

A fourth son, Joseph, employee of the Taylor Engineering Co. at the National Cypsum Company plant here this week was notified to report for final examination.

A fifth son, Philip, twin brother of Daniel, will be eligible for service when draft regulations are broadened to include persons now deferred because of the dependency of parents, brothers and sisters.

The sixth son in the O'Leary family, John, is married and is entitled to deferment under the present draft regulations.

Of the three boys now in service, Lawrence recently became a private first class in the Air Corps at Langley Field, Va. Prior to enlisting he was employed at Everitt's Drug Store.

Paul, who was a student at the

Bellefonte High School and who was working part time at the Boston Candy Kitchen when he enlisted some months ago, was in California when last heard from. He is now believed to be en route to active duty in foreign service.

Daniel is in the Tank Division at Camp Polk, Louisiana. Before enlisting the service he was employed by the Universal Match Company here.

Dan's twin brother Phil, living at home, has been employed at the Plaza theatre for some time.

John O'Leary has been employed by the West Penn Power Company. In addition to the six sons, the O'Leary family includes two daughters, Honora, employed at the A & P Super Market, Lee, Va., to headquarters.

The Emblem of Honor has been awarded to one mother in this area, the recipient being Mrs. Joseph Little, of Driffting, who has four sons in the service. They are: Sgt. Byron B. Little; Sea. Joseph Little, Jr.; Sk. 1st Guy M. Little, and Pvt. Gerald Little.

In awarding the emblem to Mrs. Little officers of the Association declared it to be the group's belief that any woman who contributes so handsomely to the defense of her country is deserving of an award of this kind, and recognition, not only by her community, but by the nation as a whole.

Enters Officers' School

After successfully completing a twelve week intensive course of instruction, Officer candidate Valmont will be commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army of the United States, (Air Forces). At this school, the first of its kind, the Officer candidate studies 32 specialized courses in administrative, personnel and supply duties. Upon graduation, officers will be assigned to duty in one of these departments in the Air Forces thus relieving trained pilots from such duties and allowing them to devote their full time to flying. The immediate availability of housing and training facilities plus excellent climatic conditions prompted Army officials to choose Miami Beach as the ideal location for the school.
