The simplest test is to double O the ring together and press the fold with the fingers. The rubber should not crack under this treatment. A good rubber ring should also stretch to twice its length and return without change of shape.

L. N. A .- What is the origin of hot cross buns?

Ans .- For centuries hot cross buns have been the highlight of breakfasts on Good Friday morning. The origin of the custom is traced all the way back to pagan times, when similar cakes were offered to Apollo, Diana, Hecate, and the Moon, The buns can be traced through the Jewish passover cakes and on through the eucharistic bread, or cross-marked wafers mentioned in St. Chryscstom's Liturgy. The dough for the buns was made of the same dough kneaded for the Host, or the bread or water used in the sacrament of Holy Communion. The buns were marked with a cross indicating the passing of Jesus Christ and were said to keep twelve months without turning mouldy

Since this is the season of the year when labor is most needed, time-saving in the operation of cutting and peeling of pulpwood is just as vital as in other fields of endeavor. If the trees to be cut are felled, limbed and peeled during this period and the skidding, cutting to lengths, and shipping delayed until fall or winter, almost double the quantity of wood can be prepared for every hour expended

during the peeling season. Use of proper tools, well sharpened and fitted, will likewise save many precious hours. Needed tools include axe, croscut saw, felling wedge, and bark spud, A satisfactory bark spud either can be made from an auto spring or hoe or be purchased from a hardware store. Information on the selection of tools and their fitting, as well as the preparation of the wood and its marketing can be obtained from the Agricultural Extension Association office in Bellefonte.

Serious study of them might perhaps guide some institutions against getting off on the wrong foot as they did in

another contest for Governor some few years Senator Davis is paying his own way as a candidate, which is something wholesome and refreshing in Pennsylvania politics. As Governor he would not be handcuffed and hobbled to the capitalistic interests. He would be free to be the Governor of and for the people, and this would be equally wholesome and refreshing. The good Lord knows we need such a Governor at Harrisburg. The power of his office could not be forced to throttle legislation aimed to benefit the underprivileged—the men and women and particularly the children who through no fault of their own are blessed with few of the comforts and necessities of life.

I am saying here merely what many Republicans admit privately, namely, that the Republican Party in Pennsylvania cannot win next November without the support of the farmers and Labor. It is folly-sheer folly-to nominate candidates who stand a doubtful show of being elected just so that a few persons may continue to hold control of the machinery of a political organization. Already there are some rumblings of unhappiness in our Party in Centre County following the Primaries. We may need all the support possible to be had at the general election. The strength that Senator Davis as the candidate for Governor would contribute might well be the necessary leverage to elect our whole Republican ticket. This is a thought worth any person's consideration.

The foregoing summarizes my voluntary expression of opinion, for whatever my opinion may be worth. This statement of my views has not been solicited or even suggested by Senator Davis or his Centre County representatives, or by anybody else. In fact, they will not know until they may read this that I prepared such a statement. This advertisement is being paid for from my personal funds.
