FARM CALENDAR

- Timely Reminders from the Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture. Stop Garden Insects—One way to reduce the number of insects in the garden is to clean up all weeds, thick grass, woody growth, leaves, or other coarse litter near the garden. Entomologists at Penn State College say that insects over-winter in such trash and then come out to make their living off the vegetable plants. Care for Heating System—All types of farmhouse heating systems require some care during the summer if expensive repairs are to be avoided. Ask agricultural engineers of the Pennsylvania State College. Generally, the system should be cleaned and smoke pipes kept dry. Ask your county agent about other points on the several systems. Better Breeding Pays—Dairy cows are limited by inheritance in their production of milk and butterfat. Only sires that improve the production of their daughters over that of the dams should be used. The dairy specialists of the Pennsylvania State College emphasize. For profit, give good cows proper care and adequate feed. Gardening is Popular—Vegetable gardening is engaging the attention of 4-H Club members all over Pennsylvania. Club leaders at the Pennsylvania State College report that many members are making sure their families have plenty of vegetables this year. Early Planting Best—Ninety seven per cent of the 10-ton tomato crops in Pennsylvania last year were planted before June 1, and 58 per cent of these were set out before May 16, say Penn State Vegetable specialists. Pigs Like Greens—Experiments at the Pennsylvania State College show that pigs on good pasture need only three-fourths as much concentrates for comparable gains as pigs fed in drylot. Coconut Palms Ceylon has 1,100,000 acres of coconut palms, believed to be 14 per cent of the world's acreage of these trees. Age for Best Work Men do their best work when they are about 47.5 years old, according to Prof. E. L. Thorndike.

NEED OF 200,000 CORDS OF PULPWOOD ANNOUNCED

To keep the pulp mills of the state grinding out a steady supply of wood-pulp to meet the wartime demands for paper, containers, explosives, clothing, plastics, and many more essential articles, 200,000 cords of peeled wood are needed this year. County Agent R. C. Blaney explains that trees suitable for making this type of wood need not be perfect specimens; soundness is the primary requisite. Most woodlots contain hundreds of trees whose removal would improve the growing conditions. Those from 8 to 14 inches use. All native woods, except hickory and chestnut, are most economical to dry and locate, are suitable. The wood is cut in 5-foot lengths down to 4 inches in diameter. From May 1 to August 1 bark peeling is easiest. Since this is the season of the year when labor is most needed, time-saving in the operation of cutting and peeling of pulpwood is just as vital as in other fields of endeavor. If the trees to be cut are felled, limbed and peeled during this period and the skidding, cutting to lengths, and shipping delayed until fall or winter, almost double the quantity of wood can be prepared for every hour expended during the peeling season. Use of proper tools, well sharpened and fitted, will likewise save many precious hours. Needed tools include axe, crosscut saw, felling wedge, and bark spud. A satisfactory bark spud either can be made from an auto spring or hoe or be purchased from a hardware store. Information on the selection of tools and their fitting, as well as the preparation of the wood and its marketing can be obtained from the Agricultural Extension Association office in Bellefonte.

4-H DAIRY CALF CLUB MEETS

The Centre County Dairy Calf Club held its first meeting Friday evening, May 1, at the Court House in Bellefonte, according to Asst. County Agent Alton B. Tait. Thirty-five club members and parents were present to hear J. C. Nageotte, Penn State Dairy Specialist, outline a good calf feeding program.

Mr. Nageotte showed pictures of how other club members had successfully raised their calves. He said that an important part in the raising of a good calf is to give it clean, ripe, legume hay which is fed in a hay rack—not on the floor.

Mr. Nageotte stated that he and Mr. Tait would check each club member for a hay rack when they visited all the dairy calf members on May 12 and 13.
