Mrs. Clark was a daughter of John and Anne Pennington Jackson and was born in Halfmoon Valley on August 30, 1892, making her age at time of death, 49 years, 8 months, and 9 days. Surviving in addition to her husband are two sons: H. F. Clark, of Warriors Mark and L. R. Clark, of Tyone, R. D. 1; a brother, H. F. Jackson, of Juniata; a sister, Mrs. Calvin Robins, of Tyone; 9 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. Mrs. Clark was a member of the United Brethren church, Tyone. Funeral services were held Saturday at the home of the son, Harold Clark, with Rev. H. G. Reese, of Tyone, assisted by Rev. W. L. Gould, of Curwensville, officiating. J. Frederick Noll, of Washington, D. C., former resident of Bellefonte and brother of Dr. Richard P. Noll of this community, died at the Veterans' Facility Hospital at Perry Point, Md., on Tuesday morning, May 5, 1942, after a year's illness with lymphatic leukemia. Mr. Noll, a son of Charles T. Noll, of Harrisburg, and Mrs. Cora Noll, of Charleroi, was born at Clearfield on April 1, 1896, making his age at time of death 46 years and 4 months. Mr. Noll served in the U. S. Navy as a member of the U. S. S. Mohawk during World War 1. The Mohawk was engaged much of the time in laying and taking up mines off the coasts of Scotland and Ireland. During the war he was united in marriage with Isabel MacDonald, of Inverness, Scotland. Children of that union are: Cora Margaret, employed by the British Purchasing Commission in Washington, D. C.; J. Frederick Noll, Jr., with the British Army in the Parachute Troop division, and Richard, 18, also serving in the British Army. Other survivors include his second wife, Ruth Hughes, two brothers, Dr. Noll of Bellefonte and Nevin B. Noll, of Philadelphia. For a number of years before the war Mr. Noll served as chief clerk of the Centre County Commissioners, and after the war he was employed for a time at the Bellefonte airport, when it was located on the Thomas Beaver farm, East Bishop Street. He was graduated from the

Bellefonte High School in the class of 1914. Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. Friday in Washington, with interment in the Arlington National cemetery, that city.

## Locomotive Is Damaged Here

### Blaring of Whistle After Crash Mistaken For Air-Raid Signal

The continuous blowing of a locomotive whistle in the yards of the Pennsylvania Railroad here last Thursday night was not an air-raid alarm test, as many supposed, but was caused when the locomotive was damaged in a collision with a coal hopper.

The accident happened about 8:45 p. m. near Sunnyside while a yard engine was engaged in making up trains. The locomotive, traveling toward Bellefonte, sideswiped a coal car which was standing on a parallel track. It was reported that the car had been left standing too near a switch, leaving insufficient clearance for the locomotive to pass.

The impact opened the whistle valve causing the whistle to sound at full blast for nearly a half hour. Railroad men were unable to reach the valve because of clouds of escaping steam. The left side of the locomotive was considerably damaged, the running board and pumps torn off and the cab damaged.

Firemen W. E. Burke, of Lock Haven, suffered minor bruises about one leg, but engineer A. T. Irvin, of Colville, escaped injury.

After steam pressure had subsided in the damaged locomotive, the fires were drawn and the engine was towed to the local roundhouse. Later it was taken to Altoona for repairs.

The continuous blowing of the whistle caused "loose" throughout town, many residents believing that it was either an air-raid alarm, or an air-raid signal test.

**4-H BEE CLUB MEETING HELD**

At least ten Centre County 4-H club members are helping Uncle Sam—the 4-H Bee Club members. At a special 4-H Bee Club meeting last week in the Stormstown Grange Hall, ten 4-H beekeepers indicated that they owned 20 hives of bees. In a normal year these would produce well over a ton of honey, according to County Agent R. C. Blaney.

Mr. E. J. Anderson, Penn State Extension Apiarist, explained to the bee club members that new package bees must be fed until all but one or two brood frames are drawn out. He said, too, that by providing plenty of super room in the hive and by using a shade board and ventilating blocks, swarming can be controlled. These practices all contribute to a good honey crop.
