FARM AND HOME

Good Pasture Reduces Cost of Feeding Cows
Milk production costs are lowest when cows are on good pasture, reminds County Agent R. C. Blaney. However, too often dairymen depend on pasture to furnish all the feed for their cows, not realizing that any amount of good pasture is insufficient to furnish all the nutrients necessary for high production.
When cows are first turned on pasture, milk production goes up and then from June to September it may fall rapidly unless the dairymen plan and feed accordingly.
Feeding some dry hay throughout the summer is a good practice adopted by some dairymen. Dry hay helps to slow up the pasture grass through the digestive tract, thus allowing the cow to assimilate more nutrients from the grass. In larger amounts hay helps to make up the shortage of feed when pasture becomes short because of dry weather. Many dairymen also plan to have silage or a green feed to supplement the pasture during July and August.
Grain feeding will depend on the pasture and feed available. If pasture is plentiful, the high testing breeds will not need any grain if they are not milking over 20 pounds a day. If cows milk more than 20 pounds a day they need grain at the rate of 1 pound for each 4 or 5 pounds of milk daily. The lower testing breeds will not need grain on good pasture if not milking over 25 pounds a day, but over that amount they will need 1 pound of grain for each 5 or 6 pounds of milk daily.
The rates suggested are guides because conditions and amounts of pasture and other feeds vary tremendously from farm to farm.
The amount of protein in the grain also will vary depending on feed conditions. During May and June 16 per cent crude protein mixture usually is sufficient, but later it may be necessary to feed an 18 or 20 per cent mixture if pasture is dry and short.

per cent superphosphate helps the growth and yield and hastens maturity. It is the safest material to use in the drill. On poor soils some phosphorus or a complete fertilizer, such as 0-14-6 or 2-12-6 is desirable. With mixed goods, the amount applied with the seed should be kept down to 150 pounds an acre or put on as a separate operation to avoid danger of killing the inoculating bacteria or hurting germination.

Prepare Market Lambs to Get the Best Price
Ram lambs going to market after July 1 will be discounted \$1 per hundred pounds, according to County Agent R. C. Blaney. He urges farmers to convert all male lambs not needed for breeding purposes into weathers between two and four weeks of age.
Lambs of both sexes should be decked when a week or two weeks of age. Little shock is experienced at this time.
The farmer who is careful in providing for the lamb's health and feeding needs early plowing and thorough working. Drilled in a dry seeded, soybeans will seldom germinate until rain falls. If a crust forms, a weeder or spike harrow must be used to let beans come up. Sown after a good rain in a warm, moist seeded, beans come up quickly and get ahead of the weeds. One inch is deep enough to sow.
Drilled solid, the rate is 2 bushels an acre; in rows, the rate is 3 to 4 pecks. In dry seasons and on rather thin, dry, or very weedy soils, row seeding, cultivated two or three times, may produce the best yield. Most of the beans in the East are drilled solid, most in the Middle West are grown in rows. Combining is easiest with solid seedings. A weeder may be used on the solid seedings for weed control on a sunny afternoon when the beans are 4 to 6 inches high.
Unless inoculated beans were grown on the field the previous year, inoculation is desirable especially on soils which are not very fertile. Soil from a field where inoculated beans grew last year may be applied to the seed as muddy water, or a commercial culture may be used.
Fertilization is not necessary where beans follow a well-fertilized crop, such as corn or potatoes. Otherwise, 150 to 200 pounds of 20 Bonds by bombs, Stamps buy bullet Buy U. S. Defense Bonds or Stamps every day!

Timely Reminders From The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture
Bees to Produce More—Pennsylvania beekeepers are on the job to increase production of honey as a supplement for sugar, beeswax to meet growing industrial demands, and honeybees for pollination of many crops requiring insect help to produce either seed or fruit, say apiculturists at the Pennsylvania State College.

HOUSEHOLD SCRAPBOOK
Sleep Producer
A very effective remedy for producing sleep is to steep slices of onions in coarse brown sugar, and take one teaspoonful before retiring. This will not only produce sleep, but is very healthful.
Pimple Scars
The scars from pimples will usually disappear very soon if they are bathed with a solution of boric acid, followed by an application of zinc ointment.
Scorch Stains
Scorch stains can often be removed by rubbing them immediately with dry starch, then sponging off. Repeat the treatment if necessary.
New Plaster
Newly-plastered walls should be allowed to stand from eight to ten weeks before they are painted or papered, and even longer if the weather is damp. Plaster that is not thoroughly dried out does not make for a successful job of painting or plastering.
Soothing to the Gum
The gum that is sore after a tooth has been extracted can be soothed with a solution of salt and water. Rinse frequently with this economical solution and it will give quick relief.
Fatty Soup
Fat can be removed from the hot soup by pouring through a cloth that has been wrung out of cold water. Practically all the fat will adhere to the cloth.
After a Bad Wetting
If caught in the rain and the leather automobile cushions have had a bad wetting, rub them with a cloth dampened with linseed oil and then wipe off carefully afterward, using a clean cloth and rubbing until no stains appear on the cloth. If this last is properly done, the clothing of the next occupants of the car will be soiled.
Needlebook
The oiled paper that lines the inside of a cracker box makes an excellent needlebook. It prevents the needles from rusting.
Odors
Odors can be removed from the refrigerator, pantry, or cupboard by filling a dish with boiling water and dropping a piece of charcoal into it.
Broken Glass
When glass has been broken in a room, and there is danger of small particles remaining on the floor, wet a piece of absorbent cotton, and pat around the place where the glass has scattered. The small pieces will readily adhere to the cotton.

advanced base. He said eighteen enemy ships were sunk and four damaged. The Japanese lost 100,000 tons of craft carriers, one heavy cruiser, one light cruiser, nine destroyers, four gunboats and one patrol boat.
MacArthur's communique, which said that "in the northeast section there is no combat activity on the naval front," boosted the number of Japanese ships destroyed or damaged in the great battle to nineteen from the previously announced seventeen.

mediately adjacent to the Fishermen's Paradise on Spring Creek the day before the trout season opened.
He also stated that it was an outrage that men who had been preaching about private landowners opening their streams to the public should be free to fish in the State and use it as a private stream for the benefit of themselves and friends during the entire season, while the average fisherman is permitted only five days' fishing on the "Paradise."
"The Fishermen's Paradise on Spring Creek is right at the State Hatchery, and is open to the public from May 15 to July 18 only this year and the rules and regulations for taking fish there are very strict. There are no barriers of any kind in the stream and the trout migrate freely so that that part of the stream which has been posted is actually the same as the fishing is concerned, but there are no rules or regulations to protect the fish.
"Later developed that M. C. Merritts, president of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, assisted Deibler in the actual posting. It is also a well known fact that his family and friends also enjoy the fine fishing there—fishing provided by the fishermen of the State, whose license money stocks the Fishermen's Paradise with extra-large fish direct from the hatchery.
