Must Increase Defense Saving

is designed to make all wage earners do without little luxuries to which they have been accustomed in the past. It is designed to prevent those earning good wages from going into the open market and bidding for goods they want. To prevent threatened inflation, the Pledge for Victory purchases of bonds and stamps must "hurt" a little, it was explained.

There must be real sacrifices. There must be curtailment of the normal manner of living, it was stressed.

If income earners do not cooperate voluntarily, the government is prepared to take steps to enforce compulsory sales of bonds and stamps. It is of prime importance for the income earner to bear in mind constantly that his savings now will help him later.

Reports from all sections of Pennsylvania to date reveal that the purchase of bonds and stamps at present averages only three per cent of income instead of ten. Few persons in other words, are making the sacrifice deemed essential to a speedy conduct of the war, and to the peace which will follow.

July has been set at the deadline for the tryout of the voluntary plan. If results aren't forthcoming by that time, the mandatory provisions are to be invoked.

The Centre county quota for May has been fixed at \$127,700. The June quota is fifty per cent greater. The July quota for the county is set at \$255,000, and that figure will remain the same throughout succeeding months.

Of the county quota of \$255,000 beginning in July, the Bellefonte district of which Swengel Smith is chairman, is expected to produce sales totaling \$80,000 monthly. The total sale of bonds and stamps in this district during April was \$49,623.45, or approximately one-half what it must be beginning in July.

The Bellefonte district is expected to purchase \$200,000 in bonds and stamps each year. As an indication of what this means, Mr. Smith's report of the Pledge for Victory campaign reveals that if every person lives up to the pledges made during that drive the annual total will be only \$265,851.41. It means that the average income earner in the district will have to purchase more than three times the amount of bonds and stamps pledged.

Mr. Aikens and his district leaders were high in their praise of the scores of persons who aided in the Payroll Allotment and Victory Pledge campaigns. The county, in comparison with others in the state, made a most commendable showing. Mr. Aikens said, and he declared he has every reason to be proud of the fine cooperation given, the work in all parts of the county.

"The job has begun," Mr. Aikens declared. "We're through with most of the detail work, but every effort must be made to induce every income earner throughout the county to buy a few more bonds and stamps than he thinks he can afford."

"In this war we're not advocating 'Give 'Till It Hurts' as we did during World War I," Mr. Aikens concluded. "Today we urge 'Buy Bonds 'Till It Hurts.'"

"The difference between the two is that in World War I the gift was not returned," he pointed out. "The purchase of bonds today will be a 'gift' to yourself later on," he concluded.

Historical Group Elects Officers

Former Judge Furst Re-elected Head of Historical Society

Former Judge James C. Furst, of Bellefonte, was re-elected president of the Centre County Historical Society at the annual meeting of that organization in the court house last Thursday night. About 50 persons were present.

Other officers chosen were: Dr. J. P. Selsam, State College, first vice president, re-elected; Philip Wion, Bellefonte, second vice president; J. Thomas Mitchell, Bellefonte, re-elected secretary; and Hays W. Mattern, Jr., Bellefonte, re-elected as treasurer.

At the meeting it was proposed that two sesqui-centennials which occur in Centre county this year be observed. The celebrations proposed are those of the founding of the great iron industries of this section, of which Colonel Samuel Miles and Colonel John Patton were the founders, and the founding of the village of Milesburg.

An interesting talk on early Indian trails in this area and the first pioneer activities of Centre county was given by Judge Furst.

V. F. W. BUDDY POPPY SALE TO BE HELD MAY 16

"With our country again at war, wearing the Buddy Poppy becomes more than a gesture of charity—it is a symbol of gratitude to those who have served, and are now serving the cause of democracy," Commander James J. Leitzell, of Post No. 1690, V. F. W., Bellefonte, said yesterday. "The existence of a renewed spirit of patriotism gives us every reason to expect the 21st annual V. F. W. Buddy Poppy sale announced locally for May 16 will be the largest in the history of the organization," he added.

For the first time, men in the active military service will share with disabled and unemployed veterans, and their dependents and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans, as the beneficiaries of the Buddy Poppy sale.

A percentage of the Buddy Poppy proceeds will be utilized in maintaining depot canteens, libraries and recreation rooms; distributing utility kits, books and magazines, sweets and cigarettes, and contributing in any way possible to the comfort and welfare of the men in the armed forces.

The national rehabilitation and service program of the V. F. W. also receives a share of the Buddy Poppy proceeds, according to Commander Leitzell. With these funds the relief of want and suffering among unemployed disabled veterans, and their families is undertaken by approximately 3,650 local V. F. W. posts and more than 2,500 auxiliary units from coast to coast. The V. F. W. National Home at Easton Rapids, Mich., which provides for the widows and orphans of war veterans, receives one cent from each Buddy Poppy sold.

The annual Buddy Poppy sale is a non-profit project, Commander Leitzell emphasized. Disabled veterans in government hospitals who make the little red flowers, are paid nominal wages for their work. All workers, as well as executives, are unpaid.
