Promoted to Captain. Lieut. William F. Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Cox, of Milesburg, has been promoted to a captain in the 190th Field Artillery, Camp Shelby, Miss., according to word received by local relatives this week. The promotion is effective as of February 1, 1942.

At least six years to the day of the promotion, Cox enlisted as a buck private in the National Guard in Bellefonte. During those six years he has been a private, corporal, sergeant, second lieutenant, first lieutenant, and now captain.

In a letter to his parents Captain Cox expresses his feelings in these well chosen words: "Important as this even is to me, it is relatively unimportant to everybody except my friends and family; however, this small fact should prove to anybody who cares to know that our country and our way of doing things is worth fighting for. You don't have to be a member of a government official's family; have a lot of money, or have royal blood to get along in the United States, and if that alone isn't worth a fight, I need somebody to straighten me out."

Continuing, Captain Cox writes: "Bellefonte is holding up pretty well. We came to camp with four officers and now all of us are captains."

Osceola Marine a Prisoner. According to word received from the Navy Department, John F. Blandy, Marine platoon sergeant, who was one of the defenders of Wake Island, is living and is interned in a Japanese prison camp at Shanghai, China.

Word was also received by family members that his brother-in-law, Lt. Commander Robert Greenman, of the Naval Medical Corps, has been listed as "missing" by the Navy Department. Dr. Greenman was at Corregidor when it fell.

Wives of both officers are the former Marilyn and Clara Minns, of Osceola Mills. Mrs. Greenman was stationed with her husband at Shanghai until a year ago last November when she was evacuated. Since that time her husband has been on active duty on various parts of the Pacific.

Commissioner Is Dinner Speaker

Declared that the streams of the state were well stocked with fish for the current season, Mr. French reported that last fall more than 400,000 trout and other species of fish of all legal size and over, were distributed in the state's streams. This spring more than one million fish from 6 to 16 inches in length were distributed. To produce this amazing number of fish the state hatcheries used a total of 840 tons of fish food, Mr. French said.

The legalizing of Sunday fishing in 1937 meant a great additional burden for the state hatcheries, for overnight the commission was faced with the problem of supplying fish for an estimated 160,000 more anglers. To meet the demand an 880,000 hatchery program, including expansion of the Pleasant Gap unit of the Bellefonte hatchery was launched because of the war but is to be resumed as soon as possible, the Commissioner said.

"The Commissioner's goal," Mr. French declared, "is to produce bigger and better fish." He pointed out that the number of fish produced annually is now an incidental matter. The chief object is to produce larger and gamier fish, he explained.

Mr. French's explanation of new methods used in culture throughout the state were vividly illustrated in the motion pictures which followed. Mr. Butler, who spoke informally during the showing of the pictures, said that as soon as they have been edited and titled they will be shown elsewhere throughout the state.

ROSS, MARTIN, GOVERNOR NOMINEES

For the county chairmanship by a vote of 2161 to 1862. Mrs. Lucille S. Ward, of Bellefonte, received 2361 votes for the vice chairmanship as compared with 1516 polled by Mrs. Marjorie Miller, also of Bellefonte.

County votes polled by other local unopposed Republican candidates were: James E. VanZandt, Congress, 3710; Alfons H. Letzler, Senator, 3457; Kenneth G. Haines, General Assembly, 3667; and M. Ward Fleming, State Committeeman, 3660.

Grover C. Lader, unopposed Democratic candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court, had 2138 county votes, while Michael A. Musmanno, candidate for Judge of the Superior Court, polled 2065 votes. He also was unopposed.

For Lieutenant Governor Centre County Democrats favored Ramsey S. Black over Elmer Kilroy, Black's total being 1332, and Kilroy's 963.

For Secretary of Internal Affairs Warren Hess polled 1179 votes and Leo Achtermann had 1109. For Congressmen-at-Large the votes were: William M. Leader, 865; Frank A. Coohran, 460; and Inez B. Peol, 872.

Republican votes polled in the county for State officers were: Judge of the Supreme Court, Allen Stearne, 1294; William B. McClenachan, Jr., 302; John S. Pine, 1017; and J. Ambler Williams, 809.

Judge of the Superior Court: Joseph Stadfield, 1366; John McEl Smith, 1167; and W. Walter Braham, 894.

Lieutenant Governor: John C. Bell, Jr., 1833; William J. Hamilton, Jr., 1473; and Ellwood J. Turner, 465.

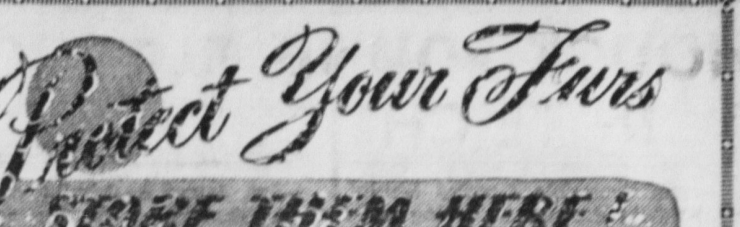
