Monday, May 18, 1942, after an illness with a complication of diseases. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Deakin and was born in Clearfield county on May 7, 1884. Surviving are two brothers and a sister, Thomas, of Phillipsburg; Walter, of Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Harry Tacher, of Illinois.

CHARLES WESLEY HOCKMAN Charles Wesley Hockman, of State College, R. D., retired miller, passed away at his home there at 6:45 p. m. Sunday, May 17, 1942, after a three months' illness with complications. Mr. Hockman was born August 21, 1872, at Millheim, a son of Henry Thomas and Amelia Diehl Hockman. He was united in marriage March 14, 1910, to Sadie Marie Moon of Blanchard, who passed away December 18, 1925. One daughter, Mrs. Myron Breece, of Baltimore, Md., survives. The deceased was a member of the Methodist church. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at Koch's funeral home, State College, with Rev. W. E. Watkins officiating. Interment took place at Houserville.

EZRA C. HARTER Ezra Clayton Harter, prominent retired Penn's Valley farmer, died at 5 a. m. Sunday, May 17, 1942, at his home near Spring Mills of complications due to advanced age. Mr. Harter, who spent all his life in Penn's Valley, was 80 years, 5 months and 13 days old at the time of his death. Council Approves Lamb St. Closing

(Continued from page one) the proposal showing how water and sewer lines, parking, and other matters would be handled at the school. In the event the request was granted.

Ralph C. Blaney, chairman of the school building committee, acted as spokesman and after explaining the proposition declared that the board feels that the advantages gained through closing the street would outweigh the disadvantages which would result.

Reasons advanced for the street closing included: greater safety to school pupils; a substantial addition to the value and usefulness of the school property; and a vast increase in the size of the playground at the school.

Mr. Blaney envisioned the new school as a building which will become an important community center, principally because it will give Bellefonte for the first time in history an auditorium of ample size for the town, and because the playground may be illuminated and equipped with public speaking facilities with a minimum of time and effort, for use for outdoor public gathering.

At the session it was reported that the borough tax millage for the year 1942 had been fixed at the same rate as last year—11 mills for general government, and 2 mills for interest.

The committee named to fix the salary increment for Philip Saylor, who recently was given the added duties of borough manager, recommended an increase of \$25 a month, and the recommendation was accepted.

Council voted in favor of installing two additional telephones in the Council chambers for the use of the local Council of Civilian Defense. Severe penalties are to be invoked against Bellefonte business men who fail to comply with a recent borough ordinance providing for the turning off of store lights during blackouts. All stores either must have outside switches for turning off window lights, or must keep lights turned off at night when no one is in the store. Night lights in stores must be of approved types. Failure to observe the ordinance entails a fine of \$500. Council decided to issue a final warning, and violations after that time will be prosecuted.

The police report submitted by Chief of Police Harry Dukeman showed 68 tags issued for parking violations; 1 larceny investigation; 9 accident investigations; 2 arrests for drunk and disorderly conduct; 1 transient lodged in lock-up; 1 arrest for drunken driving; receipts of \$154.25 from parking meters, and \$10.40 from market fees.

I. S. Horton, retained by Council some weeks ago to make a complete map of the borough water mains and valves, submitted the finished product and payment of his bill for \$275 was approved. The map is said to be of great value in quickly locating various mains and pipes.

Authorization was given the Street committee to proceed with necessary repairs to the steel bridge spanning the Gamble Mill Race on West High street at the Thomas store. Some of the steel girders are badly rusted and must be replaced, it was reported.

In regard to a proposed widening of a curve at the Sheriff's garage on East High street, the secretary of Council was directed to inform the Union Cemetery Association, which suggested the project, that the borough is interested but is financially embarrassed.

The County Commissioners are to be notified to take steps to prevent earth from the County Home property from being washed over Wilson street and into borough sewers and catch basins.

Council president W. W. Sieg again suggested that a speed trap be set up in Bellefonte to curb habitual speeding by many drivers. He suggested that warnings be issued during the first week the trap was in operation and that fines be levied after that time.

Council authorized the fire and police committee to purchase a new uniform for Chief of Police Harry Dukeman.

Aerial bombs as blackout warning signals in Bellefonte are to be given a tryout in the near future. A small number of bombs have been ordered for the tests.

The fire and police committee was instructed to investigate a complaint by Mrs. Charles Barner about noise created by a flock of guineas owned by a neighbor. When a Councilman said he had been receiving complaints about radio interference, it was suggested that complainants must make a written and signed complaint. Borough manager Philip Saylor and the Fire and Police committee were authorized to employ a stenographer for the borough office, if and when the present stenographer accepts a new position offered her. Applicants for the probable vacancy were Mrs. Pauline Witmer Jenkins and Miss Ann Kelleher.
