The Children's Day services will be held June 14th. The flooring for the U. B. church arrived last Thursday afternoon.

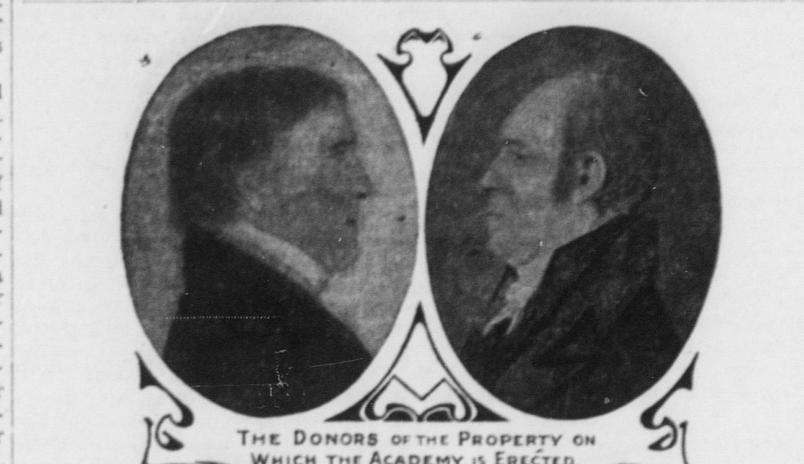

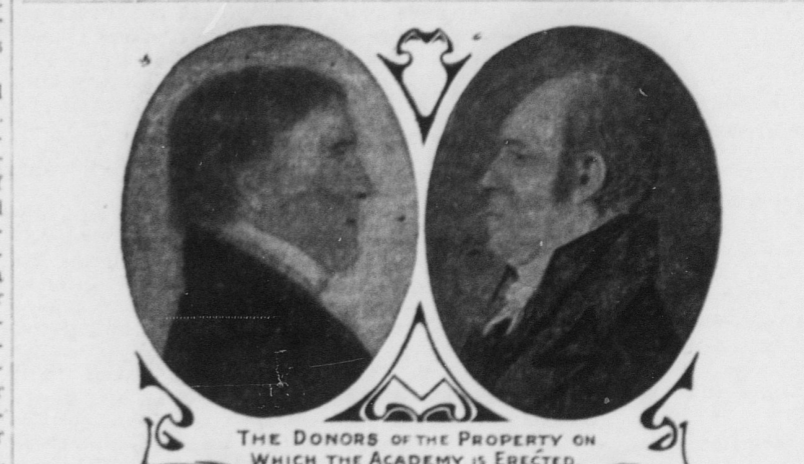
