

Mr. Hughes held on until the spring of 1933 when he sold out to what proved to be an unfortunate educational setup. At the end of that school year, June 1934, the Trust Company of Pittsburgh foreclosed on the mortgage.

Since that time Mr. Hughes has served as caretaker of the Academy property, and he, like many another Bellefonte resident, has never lost hope that when the high school vacates the Academy building an effort will be launched on the part of Academy Alumni to reopen the Academy as an improved and modern institution of learning.

In the meantime if negotiations now under way to have the Government take over the school for the war effort plove successful, restoration of the school as a private institution may be delayed but the government use would in no way detract from a possible future move
