Flag Is Raised At Clarence Hall

Judge Ivan Walker, Rev. J. W. Palfy Speakers; Band, Firing Squad Present

Impressive flag raising ceremonies were held Saturday afternoon at the Clarence Hall, with Judge Ivan Walker of Bellefonte, and the Rev. Father J. W. Palfy of Clarence, as the principal speakers.

In the large crowd which assembled for the services were three Gold Star Mothers from World War I. The American Legion Junior Band of Bellefonte, and the firing squad of Jackson-Crisman-Saylor Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Bellefonte, participated in the program, with Joseph Puhalla of Clarence, as master of ceremonies.

The flag was raised by Edward Miller, Commander of Brooks-Doll Post American Legion, Bellefonte, and Mike Botton, who was a member of the committee in charge of the ceremony. James J. Lettwell, Commander of the V. F. W. of Bellefonte, was among the honor guests.

Four organizations which use the Slovak Hall as a meeting place and which shared in the purchase of the flag and flagpole are: The National Slovak Society, the First Catholic Union, the Free Eagles, and the Greek Catholic Society.

Objectors' Camp Operate Nursery

The majority of conscientious objectors now operating at the former Side Camp near Howard, as well as those due to come, are expert farmers. Camp Supervisor V. C. Miles declared this week, and will aid the government's soil conservation program in a score of States.

The camp's principal assignment will be to operate a nursery which will produce shrubs and seedlings to be used by the Soil Conservation Service to prevent erosion.

"Most of the men are Mennonite and Amish craftsmen-farmers," Miles commented, "and they're real experts."

Nineteen objectors, already have arrived and 50 to 75 more are expected within two weeks. Most were called to draft boards recently, but some have been at a Sibling Hill Camp since shortly after the Selective Service law was passed.

BELLEFONTE FFA WIN HONORS IN JUDGING EVENTS

Competing with approximately 800 vocational students from all parts of Pennsylvania at State College recently, Bellefonte Future Farmers of America performed most creditably.

Samuel Holubec, who was in competition with 280 contestants in livestock judging, placed fifth and was second highest individual scorer from the Centre-Clearfield county area.

Competing with 172 others in potato judging, Samuel placed 16th in the State and third in the Centre-Clearfield area.

Irvin Eisenhauer, competing with 257 contestants in poultry judging, scored 114th, and was second in the bi-county area. In the feed identification contest Irvin placed 34th among a field of 126 contestants and was second in the two-county area.
