C. E. Retreat a Great Success

The Christian Endeavor Retreat, held last Friday evening and all day Saturday by the Centre County Christian Endeavor Union, at the Evergreen Country Club, near Wingate, is considered to have been one of the best of its kind ever held in the county.

The first session opened on Friday evening at 8:15, with devotions in charge of the Phillipsburg U. B. Society, which was followed by the introduction of the various leaders by Clyde McGee of Lewistown.

Robert Rhoads of Pleasant Gap, then gave a very helpful talk on "Faith," speaking from Eph. 2: 16. He impressed upon his audience the importance of having faith in order to live a successful Christian life and to accomplish worthwhile things for God.

Floyd Hill, also of Pleasant Gap, gave a very interesting talk on "The Word of God," speaking from Eph. 2: 17. He stressed the necessity of being well acquainted with our Bibles. Miss Ruth Hull of Phillipsburg then spoke on "Prayer," from the 18th verse of the same chapter, saying that it was very important that we do a lot of praying.
