CELIA TAYLOR WILLIAMS

Celia Taylor Williams, well known resident of Bellefonte, died unexpectedly at her home on Armour street at 12 o'clock noon on Monday, June 15, as the result of a stroke. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Williams and was born in Bellefonte on October 14, 1881, making her age at time of death 60 years, 8 months and 1 day. Survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Alice Morton, of Scranton; Mrs. Louisa Gray, of New York City and Mrs. Charles Fowler, of Bellefonte; a niece, Mrs. Magdalene Porter, of Mercersburg, and two nephews, Ernest Williams, of Scranton, and Donald Williams, address unknown. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon from the home of the sister, Mrs. Fowler, with the Rev. Evans David Brown, of St. Paul's A. M. E. church, Bellefonte, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery. For a number of years Miss Williams was employed in Bellefonte homes, having at various times been in the employ of the late Dr. Hays, Hardman P. Harris, and the Harry Keller family.

AIDING IN CONSTRUCTION OF NEW ALASKAN HIGHWAY

Pvt. DeLong, son of Mr. and Mrs. George DeLong, of Valentine street, Bellefonte, a member of Co. A. 341st Engineers, is somewhere in Western Canada, where he is assisting with the construction of the new military highway from the United States to Alaska.

In a series of letters to his mother, Pvt. DeLong relates some of the experiences the road builders encounter in blazing a trail through forests so dense that you can't ride a horse through them.

Where Pvt. DeLong is stationed the nights are only about six hours long, and he says "you never want to sleep because it seems to be daylight most of the time."

The days are quite warm but it gets cold at night. The road building is being pushed as rapidly as possible, but the difficulties are tremendous. After the trees are felled along the right of way, Pvt. DeLong writes, huge bulldozers push through mud which often is knee deep, to uproot the stumps. The bulldozers are followed by scrapers which clear away the mud and expose the more solid earth beneath. On this earth the road is built.

The men are provided with ample warm clothing and plenty of food and water, although there is much difficulty in maintaining supply lines because of mud. Water is taken from creeks and is purified before being used. The workers on the road wear mosquito netting constantly to protect them from the swarms of mosquitoes which inhabit the swampland along the route of the military highway.

The soldier writes that cigarettes are always welcome gifts because the brands available where he is stationed costs 45 cents a package,

and "aren't any good."

Pvt. DeLong reports that as soon as the construction crews move forward on the road, lunch stands are erected by the enterprising citizens for the benefit of soldiers. About the time the place becomes established the workers move on and the lunch stands are stranded without "patrons." "I don't see how they make any money," Pvt. DeLong says. "The road is estimated to cost between \$16,000 and \$30,000 a mile, and there are 300 miles to build, he reports. The soldiers sleep in pup tents, and have straw mattresses for beds. Small stoves provide warmth in the tents and with plenty of warm clothing they are well provided for, he writes.

Recently members of the Company found a baby moose, only a week or two old. A small pen was built for the animal and he has become the Company mascot. DeLong describes him as being "cuter than the devil." Although he likes the climate and is enjoying his experiences, Pvt. DeLong hints that a furlough would be a welcome "present."

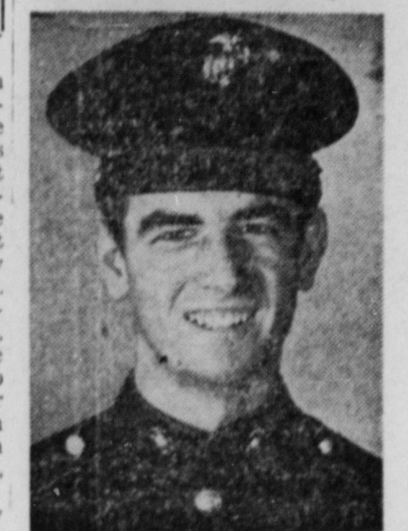
