mands that the 1942 Fair shall emphasize this feature for both campers and transient visitors. Campers have always delighted in this week of leisurely visiting; it is the belief of the committee that this year, more than ever, a week of such informal living, with its opportunity for a renewal of friendships, will be not only enjoyable, but beneficial as well. To this end, every effort will be made to keep the camp as comfortable and pleasant as possible.

Entertainment features will be taken care of, too. Again plays will be presented in the auditorium by some of the county's subordinate Granges; on other week-day evenings motion pictures will be shown. The Sunday evening service will be directed by the County Christian Endeavor Association, which plans this year to add a period of group singing to its usual program. During the day, band concerts, ball games, and a five-team troupe of aerial acrobats will help entertain Fair visitors. In addition to these forms of amusement, the concession manager promises games, rides, and shows in his section of Grange Park. The midway area is being stoned to avoid the mud of previous years.

The educational features of the Fair have by no means been neglected. 4-H Club and Vocational Education girls and boys will place exhibits and present demonstrations throughout the week; there also will be arranged a special series of demonstrations of interest to adults. Exhibit buildings will be open to all types of farm and home exhibits, as well as Grange exhibits.
