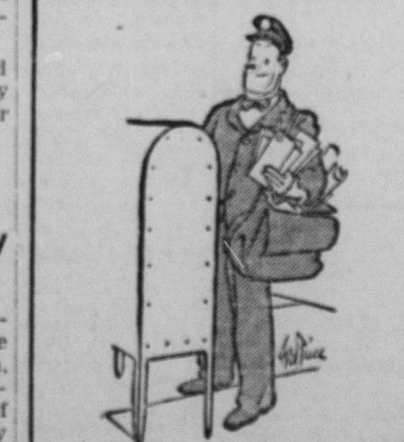
CENTRE HALL

YOUR HEALTH

Diabetes may keep a man out of the armed forces, but it does not prevent him from doing defense work in industry. Every idle hand in this country is a drawback in the present war crisis. Medical progress has made it possible to control diabetes to the extent that such sufferers may be regarded to a marked degree, as healthy. Some diabetics do not require insulin. Others must have insulin. In those persons not requiring insulin there is no possibility of insulin reaction or shock. The former can control their diabetes very largely with diet and general hygiene care. These patients may, with proper management, perform the duties of a normal person. However, hundreds of thousands of persons with diabetes do require insulin. Under proper medical control this group also may do the work of the normal person to a large extent. Many persons believe that another with diabetes and taking insulin is likely to be unreliable. An intelligent person who follows his physician's instructions carefully and adheres to his diet knows the signs of unexpected insulin effects and understands prevention. Plants, factories and mills devoting their time exclusively to defense work report that many of the diabetics are employed in doing work which requires exceptional skill. The diabetic is serving.

(Continued from page one) in immigration and building in general in these central valleys of the state, which, within a generation, was to give Centre county the foremost place in the iron business of the nation. This is comparatively true, at least, since at one time there were more iron plants in this territory than in any other county of the state. Of course, Pennsylvania was by far the leader in the iron business of the United States. Centre Furnace was the precursor of the later iron works which brought such men as Philip Benner and John Dunlop to this section within two years of its founding. It was the success of this iron business which brought into prominence the many business and professional men who adorned the annals of our early history, such as Roland Curtin, Charles Huston, Thomas Burnside, and Hardman Phillips.
