BULLETION

A crew of about 20 men from Middletown airport, with 2 trucktrailer outfits, a derrick, several tents and a quantity of other equipment arrived at the airport here Tuesday night to begin the task of dismantling the crippled Flying Fortress.

The bomber yesterday was dragged from the Garbrick barnyard to the eastern edge of the airport, where dismantling is under way. It is reported that the process will require about one month's time, since each part will be inspected and tested as it is removed to determine whether it is fit for service in other planes.

Swooping down to an emergency landing at the Bellefonte airport about 8:45 o'clock Friday night, a giant four-motored U. S. Army "Flying Fortress," unable to halt on the field, bowled over a small hangar, knocked the corner off a barn, crushed a combination corn crib and garage, and came to rest against a large tree only a few feet from the
