Hill, Va., to expect to leave there soon for two months of field training in the Carolina maneuver area, after which it will take up quarters at Camp Blanding, Fla. The entire training program for the division and other participating units is such that it will put the Maryland-Virginia outfit into the field under conditions paralleling as closely as possible those it will encounter later in actual combat. Pupils will be pitched upon the field of make-believe battle where possible and necessary; otherwise the men will have only the protection of the blue Carolina skies and the warm Carolina sod. Most of the division's training will take place in the vicinity of Ansonville, N. C., where the 29th stood off the armor-plated force for more than 48 hours last fall, earning commendation from Lt. General Hugh A. Drum and other high-ranking officers. Camp Blanding, where the 29th will take up its station following the Carolina maneuvers, is located some 30 miles southeast of Jacksonville, Fla. It is one of the newer camp installations and at present houses a division of Southwestern troops. Its present tenants will remain in Blanding to share the training facilities with the Blue and Gray. Major General Leonard T. Gerow, present commander of the 29th, will be in command of the division when it leaves its present Virginia camp, where it will be replaced by a division of New England troops, the War Department spokesman has announced.
