

250 COUNTRIES CALLED IN DRAFT

Approximately 153 Go From Bellefonte

94 From College Board to Be Examined on Saturday 575 REGISTERED IN 18-20 GROUP Board No. 2, Bellefonte, Lists 83 to be Called on Monday

During the next five days Centre county will send approximately 250 men to Altoona to undergo final physical examinations for entrance into the Army.

The new quota is the largest number called at one time from the county, board officials said. Local Draft Board No. 2, of State College, will send 94 men to Altoona on Saturday, July 11.

Local Board No. 2, Bellefonte, will send 83 men on Monday, July 13, and approximately 70 men on the following day. The complete list of Tuesday's quota has not been prepared. Board No. 2 was scheduled to furnish 180 men in this call, but through changes of address and for other reasons the quota will be approximately 170, board officials said.

A complete tally of figures made by Draft Board No. 2 reveals that 575 youth registered in the 18-20 year draft registration last Tuesday. By communities this total was divided as follows: Bellefonte, 181; Port Matilda, 43; Milesburg, 66; Beech Creek, 50; Howard, 48; Snow Shoe, 52, and Philipsburg, 154.

Survives Torpedoing of Merchant Ship In Harbor at Port of Spain

When Clarence Beightol, 36, of Bellefonte, a Second Engineer in the U. S. Merchant Marine, hears of the torpedoing of a merchant ship, he knows just about what went on for he survived the torpedoing of his ship by a submarine in the harbor of Port of Spain, Trinidad, in February.

Beightol, now in Bellefonte with his wife, the former Mildred Tate, on West High street, before booking for another voyage, is a member of the U. S. Naval Reserve and as such is subject to Navy duty at any time. The ship of which he was second engineer was at anchor with other ships in the Port of Spain harbor taking on fuel and supplies for a trip to the Middle East when a submarine sneaked into the harbor under cover of darkness and fired two torpedoes. One of them struck the merchantman while the other struck a British tanker.

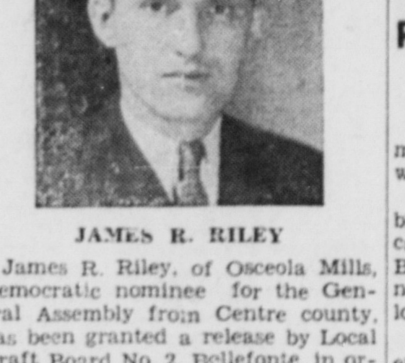
