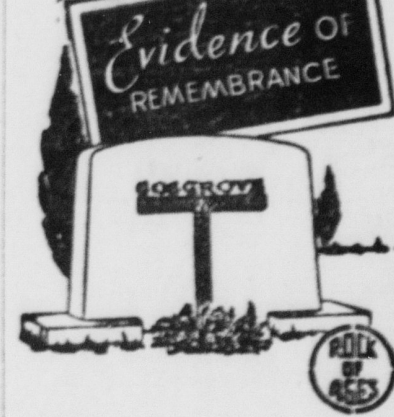
Random Items

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Notice: With Reference to Shope Street
The attention of the Borough Auditors has been called to the possibility of a surcharge in connection with the laying out of Shope Street as a public street under Ordinance enacted November 6, 1939, and Ordinance enacted September 19, 1940, in connection with the Resolution of Council of April 15, 1940.
