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1. That they have formed a "Share Your Car" club with at least five members (signatures and addresses of members must be included on application for extra fuel).

All persons applying for gasoline rationing books this weekend will be entitled to an "A" card, which contains 6 pages with 8 coupons on each page. Each coupon will entitle the holder to a unit of gasoline, the unit size to start being 4 gallons.

Supplemental amounts of fuel will be given only upon application to the board on proper forms. Col. R. M. Mitchell, regional director of the Pennsylvania State Council of Defense and Grant Painter, representing the OPA, were in Centre county Tuesday preparing for the gasoline registration.

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This suggestion did not come up for formal consideration.

The Borough Auditors submitted to Council an opinion written by their attorney, John G. Love, in regard to the Shope street surcharge matter. In the opinion it was set forth that the policy resolution enacted several years ago by Council which provided for the assessment of costs of improvements upon property owners benefitted by such improvements, was not legal, since it was not signed by the Burgess and secretary, and was not advertised.

The resolution may be made legal by having it signed properly and advertised. Council decided not to take any action in the matter until next meeting night, to give members a better opportunity to study the measure.

The police report, read by Officer John Galaida, showed 76 cars tagged for parking violations; 2 larceny investigations; 3 auto accident investigations, and 3 transcripts lodged in the borough lock-up.

The Centre County Library, in expressing thanks for Council's recent appropriation of \$250, added the hope that Council could include an appropriation to the Library in each annual budget. No action was taken on the request.

The Fire and Police Committee reported fines totaling \$49 from parking violations, and the Burgess turned in \$17.50 from fines.

The Sanitary Committee submitted the report of Health Officer W. W. Bickett, showing 12 health certificates issued, 5 eating establishments inspected and other duties performed.

The various other committees submitted reports of routine duties completed during the period.

Five Sentenced In Court Here

Shaffer, 17, of Spring Mills, pleaded guilty to the theft of iron from C. F. Shook, who had been their employer. A third youth arraigned in court in the same case was ordered discharged from custody by Judge Fawcett when it appeared that he had nothing whatever to do with the alleged theft.

According to a statement made by Mr. Shook, he watched the boys as they worked around the iron, yelled at them but they paid no attention, he said. Later he discovered the missing items and caused their arrest. Coble shouldered the full responsibility for the crime. Shaffer's part was to drive the car in which the items, including two sawmill carriages, a water pump, and some junk were hauled away. Neither boy had any previous record.

Judge Walker sentenced them to undergo probation for six months under suspended sentence; to pay the costs, and to pay to Mr. Shook the \$40 he lost through the theft.

John Malenick, of Philipsburg, pleaded guilty to a charge of drunk driving, and also to a charge of resisting arrest, although he told the court he "didn't remember anything" about resisting arrest.

On the drunken driving count he received a sentence of the costs, a fine of \$100 and 10 days in jail. For resisting arrest he was sentenced to pay the costs, a fine of \$100, or in default, serve 30 days in jail.

The prosecutor, P. J. Mirmogna, of the Motor Police sub-station at Pleasant Gap, said that during a test blackout on May 20, a car driven by Malenick failed to observe a police signal to halt near the Centre-Clearfield county line, and continued at high speed into Philipsburg, where it was finally brought to a stop.

Mirmogna said he had to use force several times to keep Malenick in hand on the trip to the county jail in Bellefonte.

Elmer Decker, of Pleasant Gap, charged with responsibility in a paternity case, pleaded guilty and received the usual sentence providing for the payment of living-in expenses and for the care of the child for a period of seven years.
