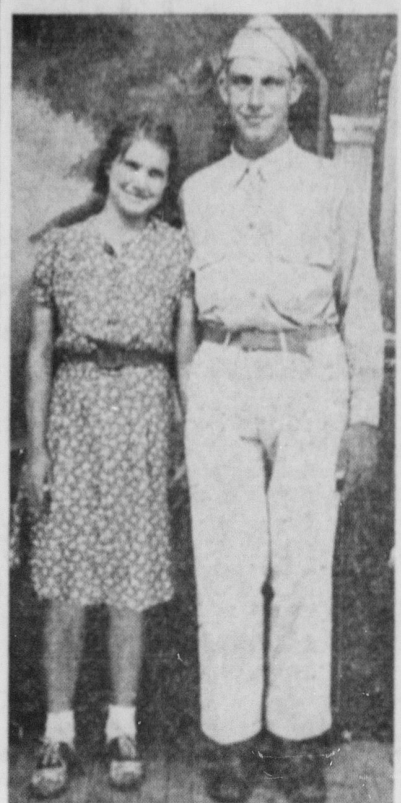

Salvage Plans Are Prepared

(Continued from page one) side and Snow Shoe townships, no chairman appointed. Zone 8, Port Matilda borough, Taylor, Worth and Huston townships, no chairman appointed. Zone 9, Unionville borough, Union and Boggs townships, Margaret Stere, chairman. Zone 10, Howard Borough, Howard, Curtin and Liberty townships, no chairman appointed. Zone 11, Marion and Walker townships, no chairman appointed. The county committee met last Thursday at the Brockerhoff Hotel and later adjourned to the home of Chairman Brockerhoff where the meeting was concluded. The nation's oil dealers, through their distributors, wholesalers and retail stations, are conducting the

collection of scrap rubber. Mr. Brockerhoff declared, but the county Salvage committee will be in charge of the collection of all other materials. Mr. Brockerhoff stressed the fact that no money is available to pay for scrap materials. Persons who wish to sell scrap materials must contact commercial dealers as usual. He urged Centre County citizens to watch local newspapers and bulletins posted by local salvage committees to learn what types of scrap materials are needed. "Obviously," Mr. Brockerhoff said, "the county organization hasn't the facilities to conduct a drive for all kinds of scrap materials at once, so from time to time, the committee will call for certain types of scrap which are most urgently needed." "Don't throw away scrap material just because it isn't wanted by the salvage committee, immediately," Mr. Brockerhoff said. "Save everything—there will come a time when we'll call for it!" The local zone chairmen will set collection points in each zone, and the county committee will arrange to pick up collections from the zone centers, Mr. Brockerhoff explained.

(Continued from page one) The condition of the body when found about 7 a. m. indicated that death had occurred only a few hours earlier, Coroner Sheekler said. In the absence of evidence showing what occurred, it is believed that Mr. Smith, walking along the race, lost his balance and fell.

Mr. Smith, a lifelong resident of Milesburg, was well known in that community. He was a son of Edward and Theresa Sayers Smith and was born in Milesburg on July 6, 1872. Survivors include his wife, the former Mary Huey; three children, Mrs. Chester Miles, and Mrs. David Stumper, both of Milesburg; Epoch W. and Hilda, both at home; a brother, John T. Smith, of Wilkes-Barre, and three sisters: Mrs. Claudia Stonerod, of Coraopolis; Mrs. Lena Shook, of Akron, Ohio; Mrs. Maude Becker, of Sellersville, Arizona; and Mrs. Stella Gumpert, of Los Angeles, Cal. He was a brother of Mrs. Emma Smith Kline, who died a month ago at Milesburg.

(Continued from page one) Miss Mary Meek, Charles B. Munn, S. H. Poorman, T. N. MacAlarney and John Fisher, all of whom reside in the area and who are more or less self-appointed guardians of the ducks, were among the first to consider ways and means of getting the ducks back to their proper place above the falls.

John Fisher, of South Water street, who is around 70 years of age, went home, donned his bathing suit and a pair of tennis shoes, crawled down the high stone wall along the creek and began rescue operations. He lost his footing once and fell in the stream. Gaily he scrambled to his feet in the icy water and again started in pursuit of the ducks who seemed to be enjoying the situation. Mr. Fisher fell again with sufficient force to warn him that perhaps the duck hunt might result in real injury to himself so he gave it up.

The others then called on Hilsener the Mayor a "cork-lover from way back and Mayor Harris called the firemen suggesting that perhaps they'd better get things under control. In a few minutes, firemen swarmed over the area. Powerful searchlights illuminated the stream as firemen climbed down the walls, into the creek and carried and heaved the blasted ducks back to where they belonged.

of constructive criticism, and to these the Borough manager sometimes replies. A Darby man in sending \$2.00 for damage to a parking meter, insisted that he was innocent and explained the incident as follows: "We turned onto the main street to park on the bridge. After getting out of the car we noticed the parking meters and the one in front of my car was broken off at the base. We stopped only for a minute or two because we thought maybe someone would blame the damage on us. That is exactly what happened."

Attorney Edward Jackson Thompson of Philadelphia, in submitting a fine for overparking, makes arrangements for future violations as follows: "Anytime you catch me, go into the Prothonotary's office and draw on the Prothonotary for fifty cents and I will straighten up with him."

A Lock Haven motorist drew a detailed sketch to explain why her car was parked incorrectly, and her letter apparently was convincing, for she rated an exoneration. A State College motorist who signs himself "Your Firm Financial Supporter," writes: "So sorry to cause you so much trouble. Believe me, if I am causing you as much trouble as you are causing me, I am truly worthy of a much heavier fine."

One Lemont man paid plenty to park. He parked in front of a theatre and put in two nickles. He asked a local citizen if that was the correct procedure for 2-hour parking and the citizen said he should have put in a dime. So he put in a dime. Meanwhile a friend had dropped two nickles in the wrong meter—which made a total of thirty cents spent to see a show. The ladies, the customer writes, looked in a store a few minutes after the show, and that's how he came to be tagged.

One of the most significant facts noticed in the letters was that nearly every irate violator included in his letter a demand that an official receipt be returned to him immediately.

Here's a New York fellow who flays himself for his "crime." He writes: "Enclosed please find ticket issued by your department for parking across a yellow line. Regret that it was not possible for me to report at time indicated. Permit me to assure you that any violation of your department regulations was purely inadvertent, due to ignorance on my part and not any intention to violate same. My record has been consistently good and I should hate to have this mark against my record as a driver."

But the prize of the collection goes to a smart cleft who doesn't give his name—only his license number. He writes: "I hope this surprises you as much as your parking ticket did me. A 50 cent fine for 4 minutes overtime, tch, tch, tch." In the letter was a gadget made with cardboard, rubber bands, and tin. As the letter was opened the tin spun around against the cardboard to give a good imitation of the Bronx cheer. And that, by gum, is what the public thinks of parking meters. Do they like them, or hate them? Write your own ticket.
