Promoted to Staff Sergeant

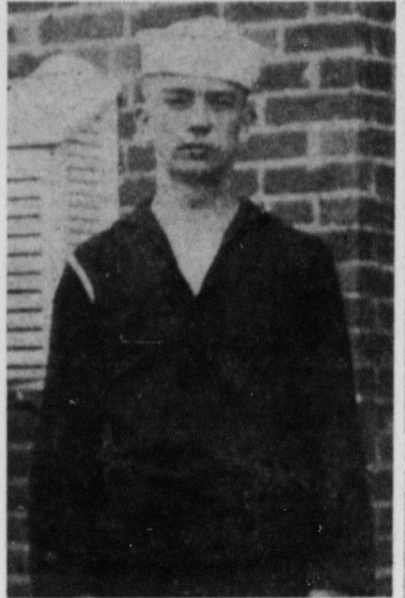


MARK A. LIMBERT

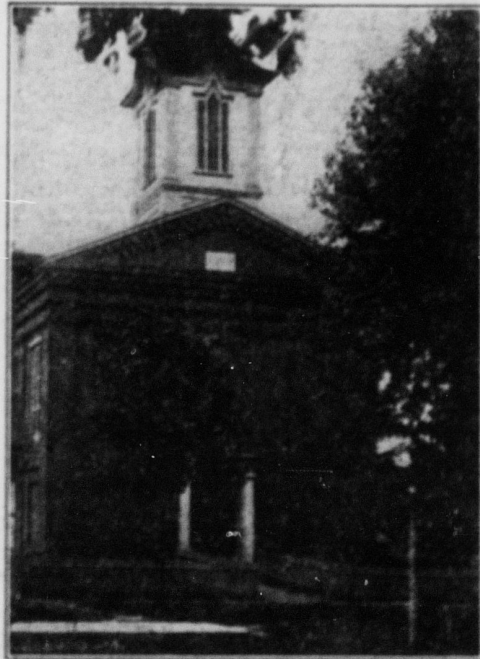

Milesburg Church 120 Years Old



Pictured above is the Milesburg Baptist church as it appears today, just 120 years after the original structure was built. The edifice has undergone remodeling inside and out since the original building was built, but the cornerstone dated 1822, testifies that the building is substantially unchanged.

In the minutes of the Philadelphia Association for 1792 (the year Col. Miles bought the Milesburg tract) is recorded the following recommendation: "That elders John Patton, William Clingham and Vaughn travel for three months about the Juniata and West Branch of the Susquehanna to preach the gospel to the destitute, and that a sufficient sum be

paid immediately into the hands of Col. Samuel Miles to bear their expenses."

Col. Samuel Miles was an active member of the First Baptist church of Philadelphia and there is no doubt that his interest in the spiritual welfare of the settlers in the land purchased by him led to this action. It was not until July 1821 that a definite organization of the Baptist faith took place. This was under the leadership of Calvin Phillo, a missionary from New York State. On August 18, 1822, a regular church was organized with 14 constituent members, the leading member, General Joseph Miles, being a son of Col. Samuel Miles.

Uses For Salt
Salt water is excellent as a throat gargle. It is also an effective spray for catarrhal infections. Salt is a wonderful tooth powder and aids greatly in making the gums more firm. Salt used generously in the water will both cool and rest tired feet.

Dress Protection
The colored suede belt will not fade out on perspiration if the inside of the belt is neatly lined with a strip of waterproof adhesive tape.

The Dog
Be sure not to give your dog cold food during the hot weather. If taken from the refrigerator, the food should be set aside until it has time to lose its chill.

Grass Stains
Fresh grass stain on the clothing can be removed by soaking in alcohol. Old grass stains should be rubbed with molasses and allowed to stand for several hours before washing.

Save Wool Value in Cool, Dry Storage
In view of the present marketing conditions, it appears that many farmers will store their wool clip, at least for a short time.

County Agent R. C. Blaney calls attention to how easily and quickly the value of stored wool can be reduced. In contact with the ground or a concrete wall, will take on moisture. Left in such condition the fleeces soon will become musty. Under this year's price regulations, such wool will be reduced in price about 10 cents a pound.

The average flock of sheep in Pennsylvania numbers about 30 head which will clip about 200 pounds of wool. The loss, therefore, to the grower whose wool is damaged in storage is no small sum.

Wool growers have found that the best way to handle their clip is to pack the fleeces in regular wool sacks as soon as shorn. Then they store the wool in a cool, dry place where it will take on no additional moisture and at the same time will not lose much weight.

Mill Hall Man Tossed 50 Feet

Charles Hill Has Miraculous Escape From Death at Flemington

A Mill Hall, R. D. resident escaped apparently without serious injury Monday night when he was tossed 50 feet as he was struck by an auto. A Detroit man was under \$500 bail for court after pleading guilty to hit-and-run driving in the case.

Charles Hill, 27, employe of a used car establishment at Flemington, was walking on the berm where the highway passes the Albert C. Brown property, when he was struck by Zeigler's car. He was tossed onto the Brown lawn and members of the family administered first aid.

Pvt. C. B. Benson of the Lock Haven detail of State Motor Police, said Zeigler continued for about 375 feet, stopped to talk to a passerby, then went on a short distance to the home of his brother, Mervin Zeigler, with whom he had been staying. The policeman said he understood the Zeiglers intended to return to the scene, but before they did so he had arrived at the Zeigler home.

Late Monday night the Detroit man was taken before Alderman T. Mark Brungard, Lock Haven, where he entered a plea of guilty to hit-and-run driving and posted bond.

Hill, who suffered facial lacerations, shoulder and internal injuries and bruise burns, was taken to Mill Hall, R. D. by his brother, Carl.

HOUSEHOLD SCRAPBOOK

Perspiring Feet
Feet that perspire excessively should be bathed every night in warm water and epsom salts. Dry thoroughly and massage with a well-shaken half-and-half mixture of alcohol and mineral oil. In the morning sprinkle between the toes a powder made of boric acid powder and talcum powder. Dust the inside of the shoes with this powder.

The Electric Fan
The noise caused by an electric fan will be greatly lessened if the fan is placed on a folded Turkish towel before it is started.

Substitute Solder
A leak in the sprinkling can, or other such article, should of course be repaired with solder, but in an emergency yellow soap pressed securely into the leak will prove a good substitute.

Porch Pillows
Pillows that are to be left outdoors should have an inner covering of gilecloth, and an outer covering of some attractive washable material. Then there will be no worry about them on a wet day, as the rain will not injure them.

Rancid Butter
Soak the rancid butter for two hours in cold water, to which a large pinch of carbonate of soda has been added. Work the butter thoroughly and then form into the desired roll.

Reed and Rattan Furniture
Use a stiff brush dipped in furniture polish for cleaning reed and rattan furniture. This not only cleans the furniture well, but gives it an added gloss.
