Charles Hill Has Miraculous Escape From Death at Flemington

A Mill Hall, R. D. resident escaped apparently without serious injury Monday night when he was tossed 50 feet as he was struck by an auto. A Detroit man was under \$500 bail for court after pleading guilty to hit-run driving in the case.

Charles Hill, 27, employe of a used car establishment at Flemington, was walking on the berm where the highway passes the Albert C. Brown property, when he was struck by Zeigler's car. He was tossed onto the Brown lawn and members of the family administered first aid.

Pvt. C. B. Benson of the Lock Haven detail of State Motor Police. said Zeigler continued for about 375 feet, stopped to talk to a passerby, then went on a short distance to the home of his brother, Mervin Zeigler, with whom he had been staying. The policeman said he understood the Zeiglers intended to return to the scene, but before they did so he had arrived at the Zeigler home.


