### Petition Council to Ban Dust Nuisance

that the Lime Company equipped one of its three kilns with a dust collector, which, while improving conditions, was "far from sufficient."

Mr. Warner then adds that plans for additional installations were held up because of war conditions.

"It is very definitely our desire and fixed intention to proceed to an improvement of this condition as rapidly as possible," Mr. Warner's letter sets forth, adding that the company has spent much money and expects to spend much more to eliminate the nuisance.

In closing, Mr. Warner asks that the dust committee of Council communicate with Frederick Warner, local A. L. & S. Co. superintendent "if you feel you can present the effect of this situation on the community in a strong enough fashion to assist us in securing priorities for additional dust collection equipment."

This last sentence was interpreted to mean that if the citizens of the town can show convincingly that lime dust is more than an annoyance or a nuisance—if it, for example, constitutes a menace to health—it might be possible to secure priorities for additional collectors.

Members of the citizens' group in Council expressed the belief that medical men may certify officially that they have told patients privately; that much of the sinus trouble prevalent in this area may result from lime dust and coal ash in the air.

The citizens' group also introduced several "exhibits" showing the effects of lime dust. One was a branch of a tree, with green leaves covered with a sticky gray powder.

Another was an ash tray which had been polished before being set on a porch for several hours. The tray was coated with the characteristic grayish-white dust. A third exhibit was a section of porch railing. The paint of this exhibit was eroded and was covered with a crust of lime and coal dust.

Company has spent \$42,628.82 to date in dust control works here.

Expenditures from the Civilian Defense Fund established under the sponsorship of Council are to be made only with the approval of Councilmen Harold D. Cowher and Paul Walizer, it was decided. The fund, now totaling \$10,022, was set up to provide for the purchase of necessary defense equipment. The first major expenditure authorized, for nearly \$500, was for the purchase of the four air-raid warning signals recently installed in town.

The current tax duplicate based on an assessment of \$1,947,740, will yield an estimated revenue of \$25,327.12, it was reported. The eleven-mill borough levy will total \$21,421.64, and the 2-mill interest tax will total \$3,895.48, it was reported.

The tax collector's bond was fixed at \$10,000 and Council denied a request that the borough pay the premium on the bond.

Council suspended rules and passed upon its first reading an ordinance calling for the cutting of weeds on properties in the borough. The ordinance provides that if property owners fail to cut weeds within five

days from the time of receiving notice from the borough, the borough will cut the weeds and assess the property owners the cost of the work, plus a 20 per cent additional charge as a penalty.

Council directed that police be ordered to make a survey of the town immediately, reporting to the secretary properties on which weeds have reached a height deemed to be a nuisance.

Council heard a report on a survey of borough insurance conducted by Hugh M. Quigley, of Bellefonte, and William A. Francis, representative of a leading insurance firm.

The Water committee reported receipts of \$2,368, and the Fire and Police committee reported collection of \$34 from parking meters. Council authorized allocation of \$5 each to the two delegates who will attend the firemen's convention in Phillipsburg.

Health Officer W. W. Bickett's report showed 12 health certificates issued; 5 eating places inspected, and 3 nuisances investigated. The Market committee reported collection of fees totaling \$15.20.
