He was a son of James and Maria Clark and was born in this county on March 12, 1868, making his age at time of death 74 years, 4 months and 7 days. Dr. Clark was a member of St. John's Catholic church, Bellefonte. Funeral services were held yesterday morning at St. John's Catholic church here with the Rt. Rev. William E. Downes officiating. The cortege then proceeded overland to Grandview cemetery, Johnstown, where interment was made.

## Season Closes at 'Paradise'

Record Catch Reported Despite Lower Attendance; Kill Light

With the close of the 1942 season at Fishermen's Paradise, Saturday, C. Ross Buller, of Bellefonte, Chief Fish Culturist for Pennsylvania, released figures showing that more trout were caught during the year than in any of the previous eight seasons at the Paradise.

The total catch was somewhat of a surprise because attendance at the nursery this year was lower than in 1940 and 1941. Although the number of trout caught was 21,178, the number killed, 6,427 was lower than for several years previous, indicating, possibly, that anglers are coming to enjoy fishing more than the fish.

The attendance at the project was much heavier than had been anticipated, for officials believed that tire and gasoline rationing, together with the fact that nearly every able-bodied man is employed, would cut heavily into attendance figures. Most persons, however, seemed to be able to find time, gasoline, and tires enough to get here.

## COUNTY JOINS NATION IN SAVING FATS FOR WAR

Housewives and meat dealers of Centre County are joining with others throughout the nation in a drive to turn waste kitchen fats into glycerine and other war supplies.

The goal of each family in the drive, according to the War Production Board, is one to two pounds of waste cooking fats per month. It is estimated that two billion pounds of kitchen fats are wasted each year.

Trade channels have been set up to handle the flow of fats from homes through County meat dealers to rendering plants for processing. Butchers will weigh and buy the waste from the housewives.

Fats which WPB is asking to be saved are pan drippings from roast ham, beef, lamb and poultry; broiler drippings from steaks, chops, veal, and bacon; deep fats, whether lard or vegetable shortening, from fried potatoes, fish, doughnuts, etc.

Housewives are asked to pour waste fats into an absolutely clean can, wide-mouthed, such as coffee or vegetable shortening cans. Fats must be strained as they are poured in so that meat particles and other foreign matter are removed.

Instructions call for keeping in a refrigerator or cool place until at least one pound has been collected, then to take to a meat dealer who is co-operating. Frozen food lockers are also to receive the fats.

Things not to do are: Not take less than one pound at a time to the meat dealer and not take them on weekends if it can be avoided.

Not to take fats to the meat dealer in glass or paper containers. Not let fats stand so long they become rancid, as this reduces the glycerine content.

No returned fats will be used as food, WPB said.
