The following letter received this week from a former resident of Bellefonte will be read with interest by her many friends for its cordial and breezy style. The writer by way of preface says: "Mary Isabel Davis Thompson, daughter of Mr. E. E. Davis, whose local identity will be recalled as a partner in the firm of Yeager & Davis, shoe merchants. Mrs. Thompson writes as follows from her residence in Hollywood, California. "Maybe you would like to know how very much I'm enjoying your paper, which started coming to me last May. PENN STATE TO OFFER NEW COURSE IN WOOD

A new course in wood utilization, designed especially to meet wartime demands and needs of the wood-using industries of the state, will be offered for the first time this fall by the department of forestry at the Pennsylvania State College. "The introduction of such a course of study is most opportune," says Professor V. A. Beede, head of the department of forestry. "The demands upon the wood resources of the country, brought about by the war, are extremely heavy and increasing more rapidly. Because the present scarcity of metal has forced the manufacture of metal products to use wood as an alternate raw material, the course will help to give a sounder and more fundamental training in modern uses of wood. Particular emphasis will be placed upon such subjects as the identification, structure, and properties of wood; the manufacture and marketing of lumber and other forest products; the methods of protecting timber against decay, insect attack, fire, and other agents of deterioration; the air seasoning, kiln drying and chemical conditioning of wood; the determination of the mechanical properties of wood through standard methods of test; and the modern techniques used in the manufacture of plywood and veneer. Students selecting this curriculum will also be required to take certain basic courses in engineering and allied subjects offered by other departments of the College. They must also spend six weeks during the summer following the sophomore year in studying and inspecting various wood-using and forest products industries.
