Glycerin Rub
A good idea for preserving the leather on such articles as furniture, card table, etc., is to go over them occasionally with a soft cloth dampened with glycerin. Allow the glycerin to remain on the leather for several hours, after which remove any that has not been absorbed by rubbing briskly with a soft, clean cloth.

Gelatin and Fruit
Diced fruits are inclined to drop to the bottom of a gelatin mold. This can be prevented by chilling the fruits and adding when the gelatin mixture has partly congealed.

Insect Stings
The pain of a sting by a wasp or bee is sometimes quickly relieved by rubbing a piece of raw onion over the affected part.

Mildew on Cloth
To remove mildew from cloth, put a tablespoon of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places into this weak solution. Lay them in the sun. If the mildew has not disappeared when dry, repeat the process.

Varnished Floors
Never use hot water on varnished floor boards. Use a cloth wrung out in lukewarm water. Each section should be rubbed with a dry cloth as it is washed.

Constipation
Constipation can often be remedied by drinking one or two glasses of water before breakfast, preferably hot, and following a diet of coarse cereals, green vegetables, and large quantities of fruit. Honey is very good for constipation. Form the habit of thorough mastication.
