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lege Experiment Station joined the Canadian Experiment Station at Guelph, Ontario, in research work to find the cause of a mysterious disease that threatened the success of incubating chickens. This she carried on at Chicago University where she worked for a doctor's degree at the same time and had just about completed her studies when she broke under the strain of the more activities she was carrying on. She was confined to bed for eight years and while never endowed with a robust constitution she came back to take up work in other fields. In other words, she devoted her time and material resources, without stint, to others up to the time she became physically unable to get about any more. It was Miss Meek who pioneered with the late Miss Helen C. Over-

ton in Red Cross work in Bellefonte. It was Miss Meek who, out of her own pocket, bought a dentist's chair and brought dental hygiene to the Bellefonte public schools.

It was Miss Meek who made the first scientific study of the bacteriological content of Bellefonte's milk supply and urged the precautions later adopted to reduce the contamination.

As a student at the Pennsylvania State College she had much to do with the erection of the first church in the village. Long before there were men's and women's Y. M. C. A. activities she was at the right hand of the late W. G. Patterson to whom Methodism owes the honor of having built the first house of worship there.

As a graduate of the College and an instructor of the staff, her lec-

tures to her students, both on the subjects of zoology and bacteriology were used by Dr. H. A. Surface, who succeeded her and became our state's economic zoologist, and by Dr. E. H. Van Norman, late president of the National Dairy Association, who became so much of an authority on the purity of milk and was head of the great Borden Corporation when he died.

Always she was true to the political beliefs of her father and in the later years of her life tried to organize the women of Centre county to the support of them. Not that she had any political axes to grind, only that she feared the consequences of investing power into the hands of those who do.

Truly she was a remarkable woman, one of the most scholarly that Centre county has to point to with

pride. The sole inspiration of her long and self-sacrificing life seems to have been helpfulness to others. Only two of the late Hon. P. Gray and Susan Meek Meek's family of six children survive her. They are Mary Gray and George R. of Bellefonte. Aside from them her nearest kin are her nephews, Thomas King Morris, at Greensburg; Peter Gray Meek, at Washington, D. C., and George R. Meek, Jr., in the U. S. Navy service in Philadelphia.
