CHARLES BENJAMIN CORMAN

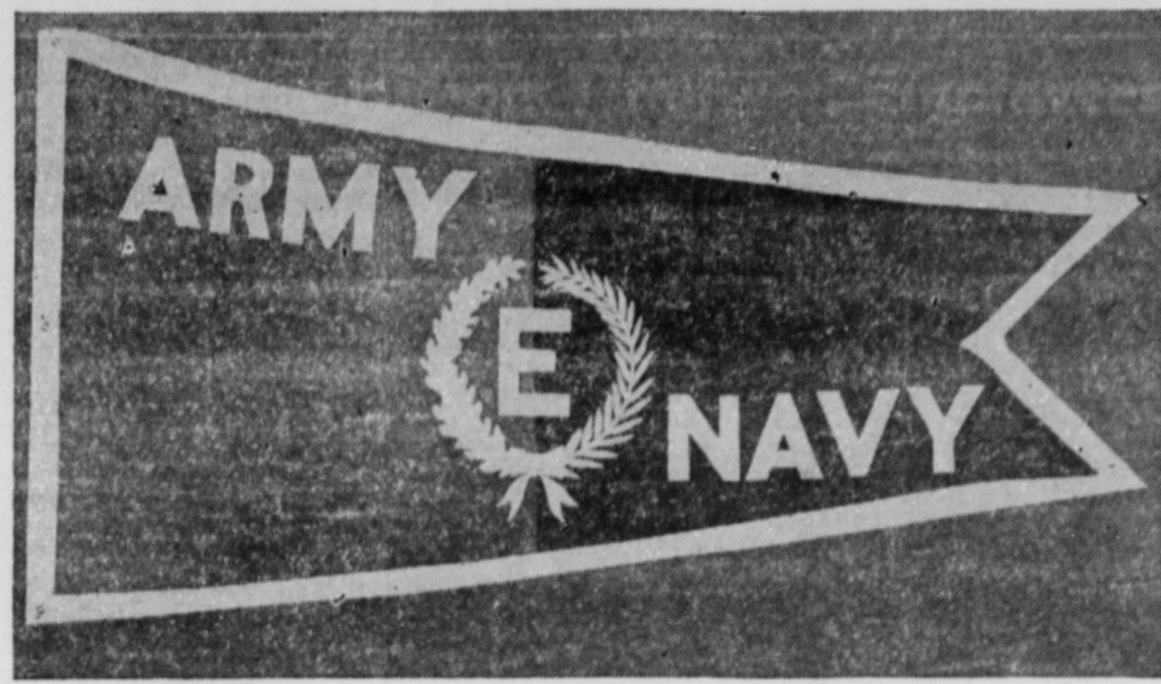

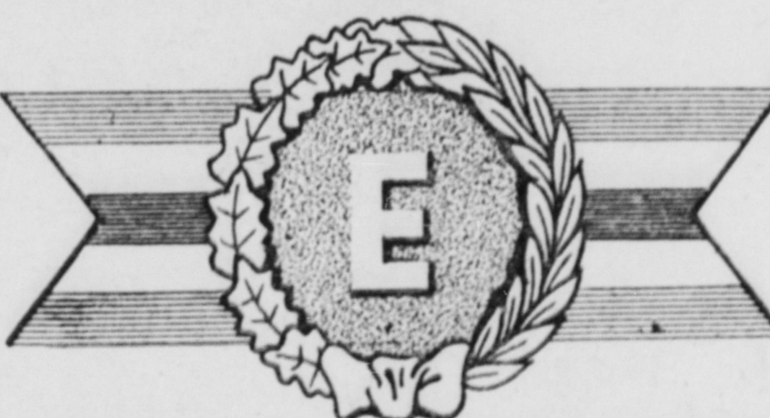

officials of the survey said. It is hoped to be able to secure permanent records of the Old Grist Mill before it is destroyed or razed. About 7,000 buildings throughout the country already have been included in the survey. Preservation of these records, and accumulation of new records on the approximately 3,000 buildings of known historical interest which are at present unrecorded (including the one in Centre county) has taken on new importance with the threat, however remote, that some of these structures may be destroyed as a result of enemy activity.
