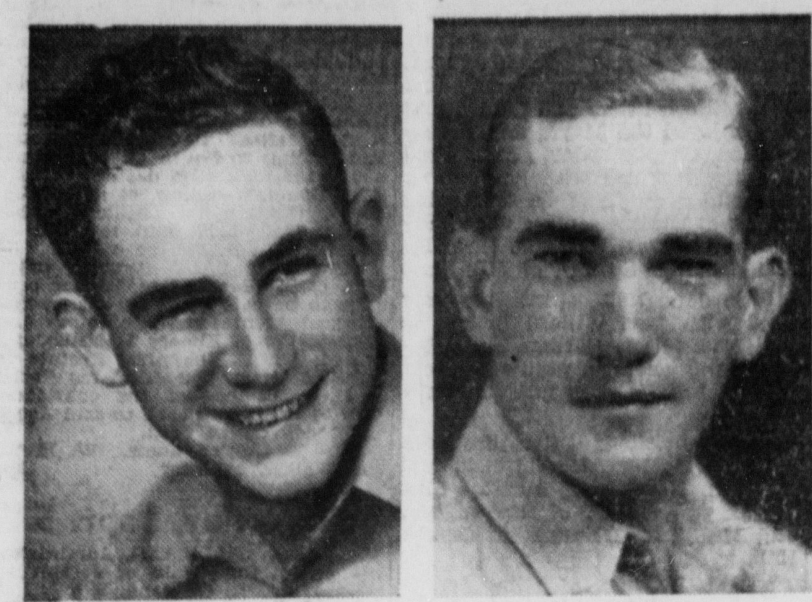


BROTHERS IN JAP ATTACK



SGT. WILLIAM BRYANT

The Bryant brothers, sons of Mrs. Mary Bryant, of Prossertown, and William T. Bryant, of Howard, were in the thick of the Japanese sneak attack on the Hawaiian Islands last December 7.

Sgt. William Bryant, 22, was stationed at Hickam Field, near Pearl Harbor, and with others in his barracks evacuated the barracks when bombs began dropping from Japanese planes. Sgt. Bryant escaped injury and returned to this country in April, being stationed with the 63rd Air-base Squadron at Gardner Field, Taft, California, since then.

Pfc. James Bryant, 22, was stationed at Hickam Field, near Pearl Harbor, on December 7, and the belief at Shafter was that the U. S. air unit was holding a "mock" attack until word of the Jap treachery was received. Pfc. Bryant has been located at Shafter continuously since then. He entered the army on April 7, 1941 and went to Hawaii in July, last year. He is 28 years old.

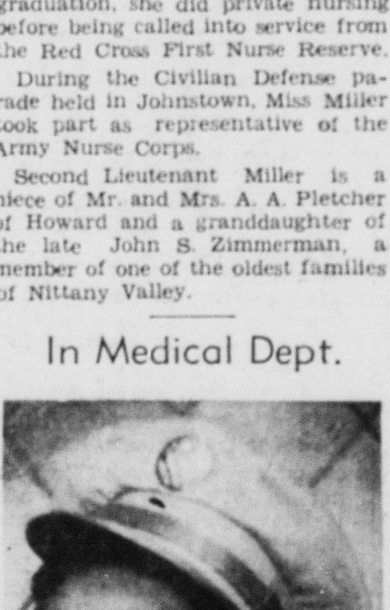
Promoted to Major

Much Speculation Over Potato Crop

(Continued from page one) son, the disease known as Stem-end blight might make heavy inroads. Blight affects potatoes so that they become soft and unusable shortly after being put into storage. As little as 3 per cent blight in potatoes at harvest time will cause an entire crop to be spoiled after a month or so in storage, it is claimed. Potato rot develops in fields with poor drainage. Large commercial producers of potatoes have the equipment and facilities to spray against blight at frequent intervals regardless of weather conditions, but the smaller producers and home gardeners have no such equipment and cannot give their potato fields the needed attention to offset the effects of too much moisture. Then too, the early potato harvest usually begins around July 15 with many growers harvesting daily until the crop is in. In the 33 days between July 15 and August 17, this year, the ground has been fit for potato digging only two days. In Centre County farmers who have harvested early crops report that rot caused some loss, but these instances occurred mostly in fields having poor drainage. Rutile in Isle of Pines. Rutile, associated with mica and quartz, is reported to have been discovered on the Isle of Pines, Cuba, recently.
