He raises a pair of hogs each year to fortify the family larder.

Mrs. Hoover, a member of the Zion Lutheran church, keeps the house in epic and span order, and despite her 72 years, keeps a garden and cares and preserves much of the food the family needs during the winter. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hoover enjoy exceptional health, and both take a keen interest in their home and community. Mr. Hoover, who recalls the days when he "bugged" iron in the iron foundries for \$2.20 for a 12-hour day, believes the Townsend Plan for Old Age Pensions would solve much of the nation's economic ills in peace times, although he believes \$200 a month is "much too high."

"Surprise" Blackout No Great Surprise

Centre county's part in the country's first two-state "surprise" blackout, from 9:30 to 10 o'clock Tuesday night, was pronounced entirely satisfactory by Civilian Defense officials, but the element of surprise was not very noticeable in some sections because word was spread about late that afternoon that the blackout was to be held that night.

How the word got around is not known, but long before 9 o'clock wardens, firemen and other officials began drifting into control centers and other points of blackout activity. There was a general air that "something was in the wind." In Bellefonte the test was declared to be almost 100 per cent perfect by Aaron D. Leitzell, local protection chief. Several stores had night lights which cast reflections into the street, but otherwise there were no lights visible.
