BOROUGH TOWNSHIPS GET LIQUOR LICENSE REFUNDS

Auditor General F. Clair Ross today approved payment of \$2,397,841 to 990 cities, boroughs and townships throughout the Commonwealth in a regular semi-annual refund of monies paid for liquor licenses issued during the six months ended July 31 of this year. Under the law these monies are refunded in their entirety to the municipality in which the licensee's business is located, for use in its general fund. Payments approved include: State College, \$125; Potter township, \$175, and Walker township, \$150.
